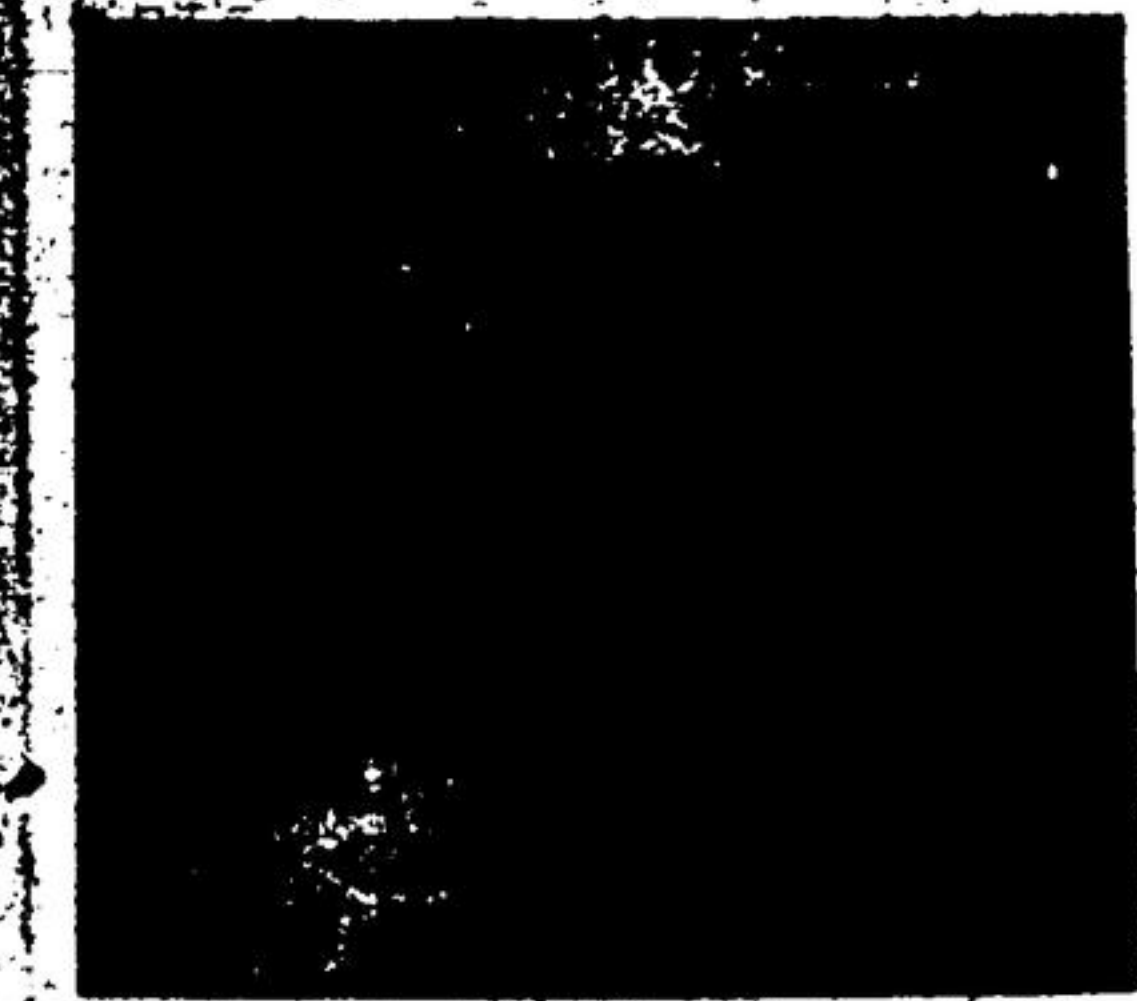


**Partner Edgar Caldwell

**Brawler 'Looked for Trouble'
Convicted on Assault Charge**

A 21 year old Erin resident who knocked out two Georgetown men and gave them each a broken jaw was convicted of assault causing bodily harm Wednesday October 27.

Magistrate James R. Black remanded the accused one week in custody for a pre-sentence report. The accused pleaded not guilty to the charge.

The court was told that the accused knocked out a waiter in McGibbon Hotel following a glass breaking spree Aug. 10 and then William Hillier who had come to the waiter's assistance.

The conviction rose out of the incident involving Hillier. The charge in connection with the attack on the waiter, Andrew Thompson, was withdrawn.

Mrs. Cecile Cassata viewed the fight from an apartment overlooking the hotel parking lot stated she saw the accused punch and kick Hillier to the ground. She said the accused kicked him while he was down, and continued to stand over him and punch and kick him in the face.

When someone shouted the police were coming the accused gave Hillier one last kick in the face and then left, the witness testified. She said she thought Hillier was dead because he remained on the ground and didn't move. She added that Hillier's father tried to come to his son's assistance but was barred by one of the accused's three buddies.

Mrs. Cassata watched the fight with her sister-in-law Mrs. Lois Cassata from the sister-in-law's apartment balcony. The scrap took place in the parking lot almost beneath the balcony.

Dr. John P. Martin told the court Hillier was bleeding profusely from the mouth when he was brought to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital Dr. M. G. O'Dwyer, a circulatory specialist, had to be called in after the bleeding continued unabated for 20 minutes.

Dr. O'Dwyer noted that the ends of the broken jaw bone protruded into the mouth and were visible. Hillier spent about a week in hospital.

The court was told both men agreed to fight flat to flat after the accused knocked out the waiter. Magistrate Black stated the accused acted completely without reason when he continued fighting Hillier when he fell to the ground.

He added the accused used force far in excess of what was necessary to protect himself.

A cook at the hotel said the accused was with a group of men looking for trouble because they were smashing drinking glasses by throwing them to the floor.

Maximum sentence for person convicted of causing bodily harm is two years imprisonment.
