Georgetown trailed the first year Central League entry in every period but finally shaped an effective attack out of their scrumbly play and left the visitors far in their wake.

Elmira scored the first goal of the game, went ahead again 4-3 in the second frame and led 5-4 and 6-3 leads in the final period but it all slipped through their fingers.

The glory belonged to Bill Dwyer. The Raider rookie who spent last season making money out of Tri-County Midjet goalies last year weaved the same spell on Elmira puckster G. Chennan Sunday - three times also belted one on an empty goal. He also set up Georgetown's first marker.
