In September 1964, Alf Spence entered the auction business. Under the name of "Alregit," he operates "The Glen Auctions" in Glen Williams. Everything from an old tin bath to valuable antique glass and furniture has passed through his hands in the slightly more than a year he has been operating.

He sells on consignment, an arrangement he feels is better for everyone concerned. He feels that for anyone with a number of articles to sell, as in estates, it is a great advantage to sell by auction. "You can sell the big things privately," he contends, "but the small things are left on your hands, usually ending up being given away."

While he started in a small way he dreams eventually of a chain of warehouses and auction sales all over Ontario.

An old hand at the auctioneering game, Frank Petch, first interested Alf in auctioneering. He made his debut at a Rotary Club auction, and once bitten by the bug, has been addicted ever since. In addition to conducting auctions, he also evaluates estates.
