Jim Bullough Georgetown Rep at Bowling Tourney

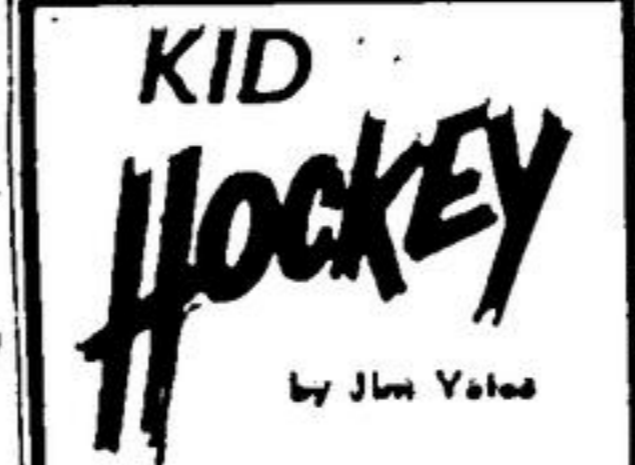
A ten game qualifying match was held last Sunday at Georgetown Bowl to send a representative to the 1966 Championship of Champions Tournament. Jim Bullough with a total score of 2508 earned the right to be the first representative from Georgetown.

The Championship of Champions Five Pin Tournament hosts 30 bowlers selected in qualifying rounds in Ontario throughout the winter bowling season.

Prize money for the tournament is \$13,850.00 with the first prize being \$5,000.00. The tournament will be held at the Shamrock Lanes Hamilton.

Jim Bullough's ten game score of 2508 was made up of games of 217, 341, 230, 208, 288, 281, 223, 327, 374, 188. Jim Bullough bowls in the Georgetown Mens Majors and is member of the Georgetown Bowl mens A team of the Halton-Peel Intercounty Mens Major League. Jim was also a member of the Central Ontario Mixed Team in the 1964 Eastern Canadian Five Pin Championship. A close second and leader for seven games was Tom Graham with a final score of 2519.

OKEY HUNTERS You've Bagged You're Deer—Now What?

May we suggest:

BROILED VENISON
Preheat the broiling oven. Place steaks or chops in greased rack in broiler about three inches from flame. Leave oven door open slightly. Broil on one side until nicely brown (5 to 7 minutes), then turn to other side for a similar period of time. Venison should be cooked rare but browned on the surface. Serve at once with salt and pepper and parsley butter.

PARSLEY BUTTER
Half cup butter or margarine worked until creamy, add 1/2 teaspoon salt, dash of pepper, 1/2 teaspoon chopped parsley, and finally 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice, very slowly.

BRAISED VENISON
(For less tender cuts such as shoulder, neck, breast) Season with salt and pepper and rub well with flour. Brown in hot fat. Add about one cup of water and cover. Cooking time, two or three hours. Turn meat occasionally.

VENISON MEAT LOAF
(For neck, flank, shoulder) 1 pound ground venison, 1/3 pound ground pork, 1 egg, 1/2 cup dried bread crumbs, 1 cup of milk, 1 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 table spoon chopped onion.

After mixing the meats thoroughly, add egg, milk, breadcrumbs and mix in salt and onion. Place in greased pan and bake for one hour in a medium (350 deg. F.) oven.

ROAST VENISON
(For round loin or shoulder) Wipe clean and season with salt and pepper. Place on a rack in a pan with fat side up. Do not cover or add water. Strips of bacon or beef suet can be laid across the top to baste the venison as it roasts. Roast in slow (300-325 deg. F.) oven 20 to 25 minutes per pound.

DEER CUTS
The loin will give the best roast or steaks (airline or porterhouse). The chuck and rump are good for pot roasts and ground meat. The round will make good steaks unless the animal is particularly tough and then it may be used as stew steaks or ground up. If the leg is small it may be roasted all in one piece and in the manner of a leg of lamb. The shank, neck, flank and spareribs can be best used for soups, stews and ground meats. The neck will be tender if the tendons are removed and will make a good roast. Venison is usually improved by the addition of suet or butter when roasting, broiling or frying. The characteristic venison flavour is concentrated largely in the fat and the removal of the bulk of the fat will make it less "gamey."

Fowler was Georgetown's big gun in the Hespler tilt scoring once and assisting on three others. Fendley had two goals and two assists, Korzak a goal and assist, Nash a goal, Llewellyn 2 assists and Foster, Fogal and Bill Neil an assist apiece.

Against Streetsville, the local Pontiacs should have had an easier time of it but chose to shoot when they should have passed on too many occasions. They had a 4-1 cushion at one point, but Streetsville came on to make it close in the last stages.
