Selby's Four Goals Eke Win Over New Hamburg

Doug Selby was shining Sunday afternoon. The glare made New Hamburg Junior Cs wince.

The veteran Georgetown junior who looks and skates like Detroit's Don McKenney hit for four goals in a row in the third and overtime periods to take the lion's share of the responsibility for sinking New Hamburg 6-5 in Georgetown Memorial Arena, a win that kept Raiders unscathed and atop the twelve team OHA Central Junior C group.

The first bullet from the Selby repeater came at 7:20 of the third from Ron Lane and it snapped a 2 all tie. He re-entranced the scene 30 seconds later but this time with Simon Llewellyn as the co-star, and then pumped his third goal without aid at 12:18.

Much as it pained them the New Hamburgers were not exactly awed by the performance. In fact it inspired the visiting snipers to react with an exhibition of their own - 3 goals in 3 minutes and 20 seconds - which almost overshadowed the Raider's sparkling individual effort.

The amazing rally brought about a ten minute overtime which only set the stage for a spectacular encore by the Raider hat-tricker. With four seconds left Selby pounced on team-mate Rick Maloney's rebound and whipped it into the New Hamburg net and covered himself with the glory that goes to the game heroes.

Raiders and New Hamburg each scored once in the first and second periods. Maloney from Marso started things at 17:02, but New Hamburg was on even terms before the period was out, Harmer striking for the visitors at 18:12.

Georgetown's middle period goal came from Paul Robinson with Mike Cummins the play-maker. That one happened at 3:07 and the lead stood until Cuthbert washed it out at 11:33. Falk, Bast and Harmon accounted for the rapid fire rally that erased Selby's outburst late in regulation time.

Georgetown also had the better of the penalty bench, sitting out 8 sentences to New Hamburg's 6.

Kewley New Mentor for Bantam Hockey Champs

One of two of Georgetown's provincial championship minor hockey team starts its 1965-66 season tonight radically changed in appearance, especially in the coaching and managing departments.

Former senior hockey star Herb Kewley is the new midget coach, Tom Rush has taken over the managerial reins and will be assisted by Bev Moody.

Their charges include John Collier and Rick Peavoy in goal, Dave McMenemy, Don Bowden, Bill Bauer, and Larry Schertel on defense, and forwards Jack Kemhead, Henry King, Jim McMillan, Ned McFarlane, Gerry Moody, Bob Pelletier, Bob Monckton, Steve Harris, Bob Richardson and Frank King. Doug Hills is expected to join the club sometime in December when an OMHA suspension expires. Just six were Midgets last season.

Coach Kewley plans to go with three lines with all getting their equal share of ice time. His strategy is for a strong finish at the end of the year. He said he expects to lose a few during the regular season, but is counting on attaining depth and good balance by play-

off time. The new coach has stated that if any of his players do not put out 100 per cent effort there will be a new body in his position in short order.

Three players are suffering injuries and it won't be known until just before game time if they will start tonight. Bill Eayer suffered a bad ankle in a collision with Gerald Moody, Ron Richardson is also recovering from a leg injury, and Rick Peavoy has an injured hand that is giving him some uncomfortable moments.

Coach Kewley said as a new coach unfamiliar with his players he will be assessing them on what he sees in the early going. He said they will have to prove to him that they belong.
