Neighbours Write Objections To High Rise Apartment Plan

A pile of letters protesting the application by Howard Caton of Brampton, for the rezoning of the "Hutt" property on Charlottetown, to allow apartment buildings were received by the Planning Board, at last Thursday's meeting.

He emphasized that nothing would be done in secret, and that all neighbours, and citizens in general, would be informed on every move. "We will have to meet the problem of high density dwellings eventually, but only with the wishes of the people in mind."

November 18th was set for a Planning Board meeting, with the protesting delegation, headed by Mrs. Jean Rundle, and the proposed developer Howard Caton, in attendance.

Chairman Claude Kenner felt that the two problems, that of the rezoning for the senior citizens apartments, and the rezoning for the high rise apartments could not be separated, and must be considered in the overall study of multiple and high density dwellings.
