Jim Kelly And Bomber Crew Will Honour Andy Mynarski

A former Georgetown man and six others will gather in Winnipeg tonight to honour the memory of a seventh who died while the group carried out a historic bomber mission behind the Normandy beaches in 1944.
W. J. 'Jim' Kelly, son of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Kelly, Georgetown, was a member of the crew which left an RCAF base in northern England in a Lancaster bomber on June 12th, 1944. It was their thirteenth mission and their last.
The six will gather to honour memory of Andrew Mynarski, who won the Victoria Cross but lost his life on that fateful mission.
Other members of the crew were Ptl. L. G. P. Brophy, of Port Arthur, Arthur Devey, St. Lambert, Robert Brodie, Vancouver, Jack Friday, Port Arthur, and Roy Higate, Guildford, England.
Their plane was attacked by a German night-fighter and badly damaged that the pilot ordered his crew to bail out. Mynarski, a 27-year old gunner, was about to jump from the rear hatch when he saw that his best friend, P/O Patrick Brophy, was trapped in the tail turret, lagging his own safety, he crawled through the blazing fuselage and valiantly tried to free him. When he finally gave up and bailed out, Mynarski's clothing was on fire. He was found by French troops, but died of his burns.
Ironically, Brophy had a miraculous escape when the bomber crashed, and lived to tell a tale which won Mynarski the V.C. He tells it again in the December issue of The Reader's Digest. As he says there: "It always bothers me that a divine providence intervened to save me because of what I had seen — so the world might know of a gallant man who laid down his life for a friend."
The son of Polish immigrants, Mynarski was born and raised in Winnipeg, where his name is memorialized by the Andrew Mynarski Junior High School. To mark the school's tenth anniversary, the local Polish branch of the Canadian Legion has arranged to bring his six crewmates together for the first time since World War II.
