Open Season Draws Deer Hunters to Area

There may never be an official tally of the number of deer taken in Halton county during the three day open season which concluded yesterday, but one thing is certain, it was popular with the hunters.

The Georgetown license outlet at Richardson's Crest Hardware on Main St. E. was issued 300 licenses prior to the local hunt but the actual dates of the brief season were not disclosed until Tuesday of last week. By Saturday noon all local and area license depots were sold out.

Halton is among 14 Southern Ontario counties which have an open deer season this year. The three day season here lasted from Monday through Wednesday. It is the first in the county in about seven years.

"An open deer season could be held every year in Southern Ontario because the deer are far too thick in many places," stated Ed Meadows, senior conservation officer for this district of the Ontario Lands and Forests Department.

Despite far from ideal weather the hunter count in this end of the county was heavy during the season, and a number of deer were reportedly bagged in the immediate vicinity.

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Kin Projects All Geared To Planned Apartments

The next few weeks promise to be busy for the Kinmen Club, as three major fund raising projects are in motion.

First is the annual fall tag and elimination draw which will be held in the Legion auditorium Friday. Sale of tickets was limited to 300 and as these have already been sold the club has an assured profit. Bill Sunucks is project chairman.

Tom Kent is in charge of the annual sale of nuts, which combines door to door selling with other forms of promotion. Nuts are packed in containers bearing the Kinmen crest.

November 28th will witness an exodus of Kinmen to a Christmas tree farm where some 700 to 800 trees will be cut and hauled to town. There will be pine and spruce going on sale early in December.
