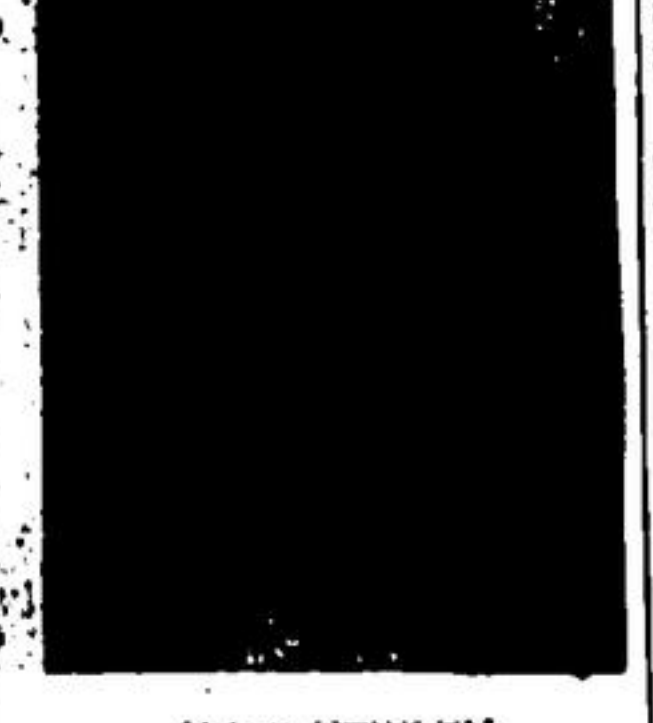
claim by inviting some new faces to the team's Sunday practice.
