

### Was Georgetown Here For Twenty-Six Years

A Georgetown businessman, Matthew Armstrong, 85, died on November 5 at his home, 18 James St.

Mr. Armstrong and his son John established Armstrong's Garage on the highway 26 years ago, later being joined by another son Arthur in the business.

A native of Northend, Cumberland, he came to Canada in 1898, the year following his marriage to Frances Fallow. They first lived in Frank, N.S., where he worked in the mines. In 1908, after a trip home to England, they settled in Norval, later moved to Lismore and then to Georgetown. He was employed for 25 years with the Canadian electrical railway which operated between Quebec and Toronto. He was a member of Knox Presbyterian Church.

He leaves his wife, three sons, John and Arthur of Georgetown and Gilbert of Schomberg, a grandchild and 4 great grandchildren.

Rev. Norman Young conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McCrear Memorial Home and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Lloyd Boyd, Harry Ewing, John Y. Armstrong, Art Simpson, Albert Dawson and Thomas Warren.

### Stresse. Proper Morals Best Disease Safeguard

The boys and girls who turned out for last Sunday's Youth Forum at the Legion Hill saw a film "Social-Sex Attitudes in the Adolescent." The program was presented by Archie F. Bull, M.D., Director, Halifax County Health Unit, and Mrs. L. Jamieson, County Health Nurse.

In his opening remarks Dr. Bull discussed communicable diseases and the ways in which they are carried and spread. Following the film the boys went to another room with Dr. Bull, while the girls remained with Mrs. Jamieson.

Speaking to the boys Dr. Bull stated that although immunization can be provided for many communicable diseases there is no such immunization against venereal diseases. He noted that whereas there is a decrease in tuberculosis and many other diseases there is an alarming increase in the incidence of venereal diseases. He stressed the importance of seeking medical advice at the first signs of trouble; but the best prevention, he pointed out, is found in proper moral conduct.

A number of questions were asked and these were all answered and discussed. The same general line was followed by Mrs. Jamieson with the girls.

Next Sunday evening parents are invited to attend and learn what has been discussed with their children, and to talk about this and any other areas of concern with Dr. Bull.
