

Author of Two Text Books Terms Published Report Garnett Dickinson Retiring As 'Powers Propaganda'

Turning it "Power propaganda" Mayor Gibbons objected Monday when council re-affirmed a decision to publish a report on costs of a planned overhead water storage in this week's Herald.

The report, ordered by council by town auditors Pope and Goebelle, shows an annual cost of \$17,812 over a 20-year period, offset by an annual saving of \$17,447 by economies which can be made with the new system.

Last week Mayor Gibbons told council the report said nothing "other than if we lay off men it won't be such a financial burden." The report stated that three employees would no longer be required in the water department when an overhead tower is built.

On Monday the mayor said council should not have to pay to have "Powers propaganda" published.

"I don't know whether he is clear on this yet," he said. "First he said it wouldn't cost

the town anything. Now it's going to be fifteen or twenty thousand a year."

He expressed doubt that the Pope and Goebelle report is correct.

Cr. Powers pointed out that the report had been asked when the mayor would not accept figures prepared by him as water chairman, and that it confirmed his stand that Georgetown can have a more efficient water system without any added cost to taxpayers.

The water tower, for which a tender was accepted some time ago, has still not received official okay from the Municipal Board. Following letters of protest from the mayor and a ratepayer, Ed Peters, the board has called a hearing December 21. Meanwhile, Pearce Contracting, the successful bidder, has been advised by the consulting engineers not to make any material purchases until after the hearing.

Garnett Dickinson Taught 57 Years

With his retirement in December, Garnett Dickinson, Georgetown High School teacher will bring to a close 57 years in the teaching profession, all in the Ontario School system.

He was born in Uxbridge, in a house built by his grandfather in 1860. Moving to Thornhill he attended public school there, and high school in Richmond Hill, graduating in 1907. Upon graduation from Model School, in London, Ont., he taught at S. S. No. 4 in Markham from 1908 till 1910.

After attending the Faculty of Education of the University of Toronto, he joined the staff of Toronto Public School in 1911. From 1925 till 1928 he served as principal of the Boy's Training School in Howmanville.

Returning to Toronto, he transferred from the Public School system to the Central High of Commerce, where he remained till 1950.

He then taught at Lorne Park Collegiate for a year, then at Burlington High School for four

Plan \$10,000 Emergency Fund for Flood Control

A suggestion that Credit Valley Conservation Authority should set up a \$10,000 fund for emergency flood control has been approved by the authority.

The Authority plans to set up the fund and apply to the Minister of Energy and Resources for a 50 per cent grant on any work undertaken.

This would ensure that when money is spent, on flood control, the authority will have approval to receive a grant without having to apply for it at the time of spending.

"It must be made perfectly clear, however," said authority chairman Roy McMillan, "that we do not accept responsibility for emergencies of other authorities higher than ourselves. Flood control is still the responsibility of municipalities."

Mr. McMillan pointed out that it is only when a municipality cannot handle a situation that the Authority steps in.

"An emergency is still determined by the legislation already set down," he said.

Would Designate Position of Operator For Garbage System

A request that town council establish an operator's position and two labourers, instead of three labouring positions for the new municipal garbage system was made Monday by the town NUPSE works employees.

The union would have an operator at \$2.04 an hour and two helpers at \$1.81.

"I thought the idea was to have all the men share the driving and pick up chores," said Cr. Ballentine.

"It's an excellent opportunity to reconsider the whole set-up and give employment to local men," said Mayor Gibbons. The mayor said it is not right to hire men from out of town and ignore an employee who had served under two private contractors for five years.

"I believe in town men for town jobs," said Reeve Elliott.
