Physicians' Services Incorporated today announced that, effective in January, 1966, dependent children to age 21 will be covered under family agreements in all P.S.I. plans at the regular family subscription rates. At present, dependent children are included in family plans until they become 19 years old.

A dependent child is defined as a subscriber's unmarried child, step-child or legally adopted child who resides with him and is not regularly employed. Students attending university may qualify as dependents.

## Speed Limit Will Be Hiked To 60 East of Georgetown

Speed limit of 50 mph on Highway 7 from the east limits of Naval to the Highway 10 junction is to be increased to 60 mph, but not before spring.

John C. Hamilton, traffic analyst with the department of highways, said Monday this is to be the recommendation to the department of transport. It will require an Order-in-Council to make the change and this will require about six months.

Mr. Hamilton said he was going around explaining to municipalities involved what the department was planning so that all would be cognizant of the move.

He explained that in 1966 the department of highways engaged in a "slam-bang" program across the province in which the speed limits on various highways were altered to meet present driving needs and conditions.

"We established speed limits of 30 miles an hour in most places 30 mph in others and in some places buffer zones of 45 mph," he said.

That he added, "Now we are going across the province trying to establish reasonable and sensible speed limits where we think conditions warrant them."

He presented drawings which showed traffic volume conditions on the stretch of Highway 7 from the eastern limits of Georgetown to the junction with

Aberfeldy's two year bull, Aberfeldy Field Marshall, won his class, was made grand champion bull, and later supreme champion of the show. Other Aberfeldy wins included: 1st, March bull; 2nd, yearling female; 2nd, mature female; 1st, get of sire; 1st, pair of bulls, and 2nd, breeder's herd.

Shorthorn exhibitors came from five provinces, ranging from Alberta to Quebec, inclusive.

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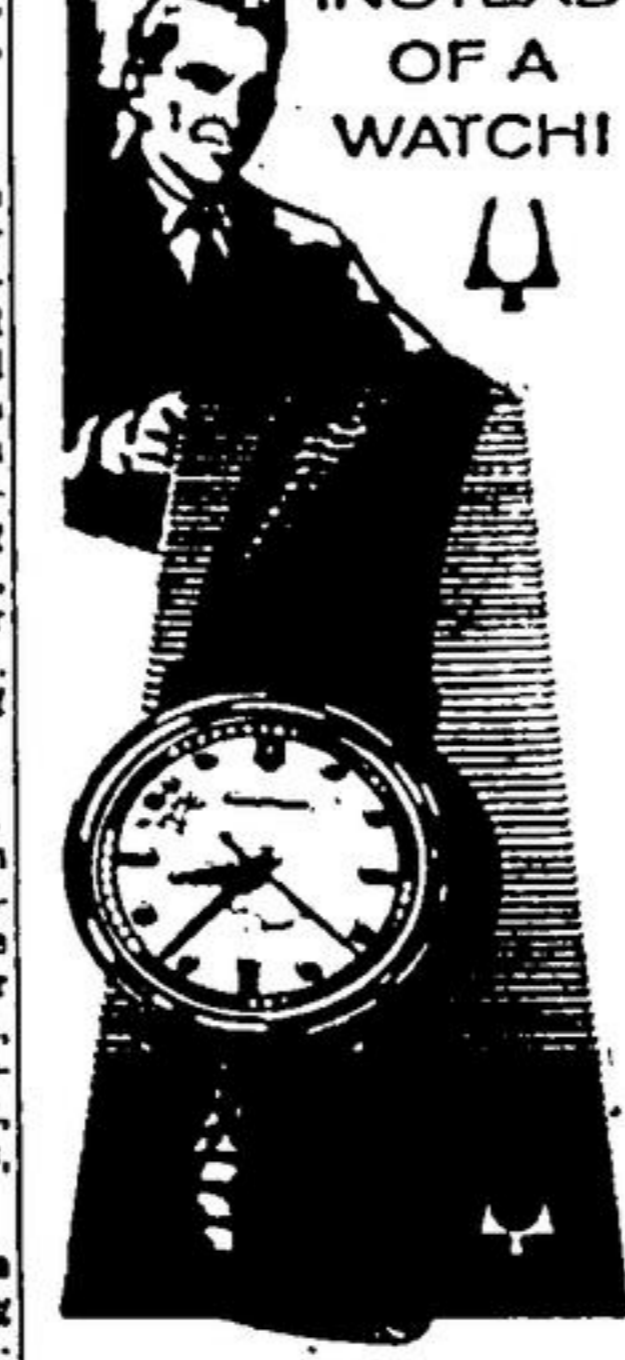
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## Display Prize Posters Now in District Contest
