

# Kinsmen Claim Rezoning Delays May Kill Apartment

Lengthy delays in rezoning plans on Harold Street could mean cancellation of Georgetown Kinsmen's plan to build low cost dwellings for older residents of limited means, a club official told The Herald Monday.

The club advises that the mortgage money is available to them now as they have the necessary applications - from local residents to fulfil Central

Mortgage and Housing requirements. "If a protracted delay due to any cause results in some of these applications being withdrawn the whole thing could go up in smoke," the club official said.

The Kinsmen have been attempting to get the planning board and town council to rezone two lots on unopened Harold Street near the Hospital

Opposition from ratepayers in the area to any rezoning in this section of town in an attempt to block construction of a proposed high rise apartment on the Hyatt property has affected their case.

The land the Kinsmen are seeking is owned by the town and was selected because of its proximity to the major shopping areas, churches, library, park and hospital.

The Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation approved the land for the Kinsmen club's purpose upon receipt of 17 bona fide applicants for the units and indicated they would provide mortgage money on this basis.

Kinsmen claim there is no similarity between their project and the high rise apartments to which some area residents have objected.

The Kinsmen have expressed concern about the future of their project and have already taken steps to request the cooperation of residents in not opposing their application for rezoning.

"The need for this accommodation has been thoroughly investigated by our club by means of surveys and we are resolute in our determination to see this project carried to a successful conclusion," he said.

# Credit Branch at Glen Now Runs New Channel

Stanley White, field officer for the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, reported at a meeting last week that the relocation of the river channel at Glen Williams is almost completed, and the river is running in a new channel.

The river course was changed in the centre of the village to stop serious erosion and save

Glen Williams Cemetery up on the hill.

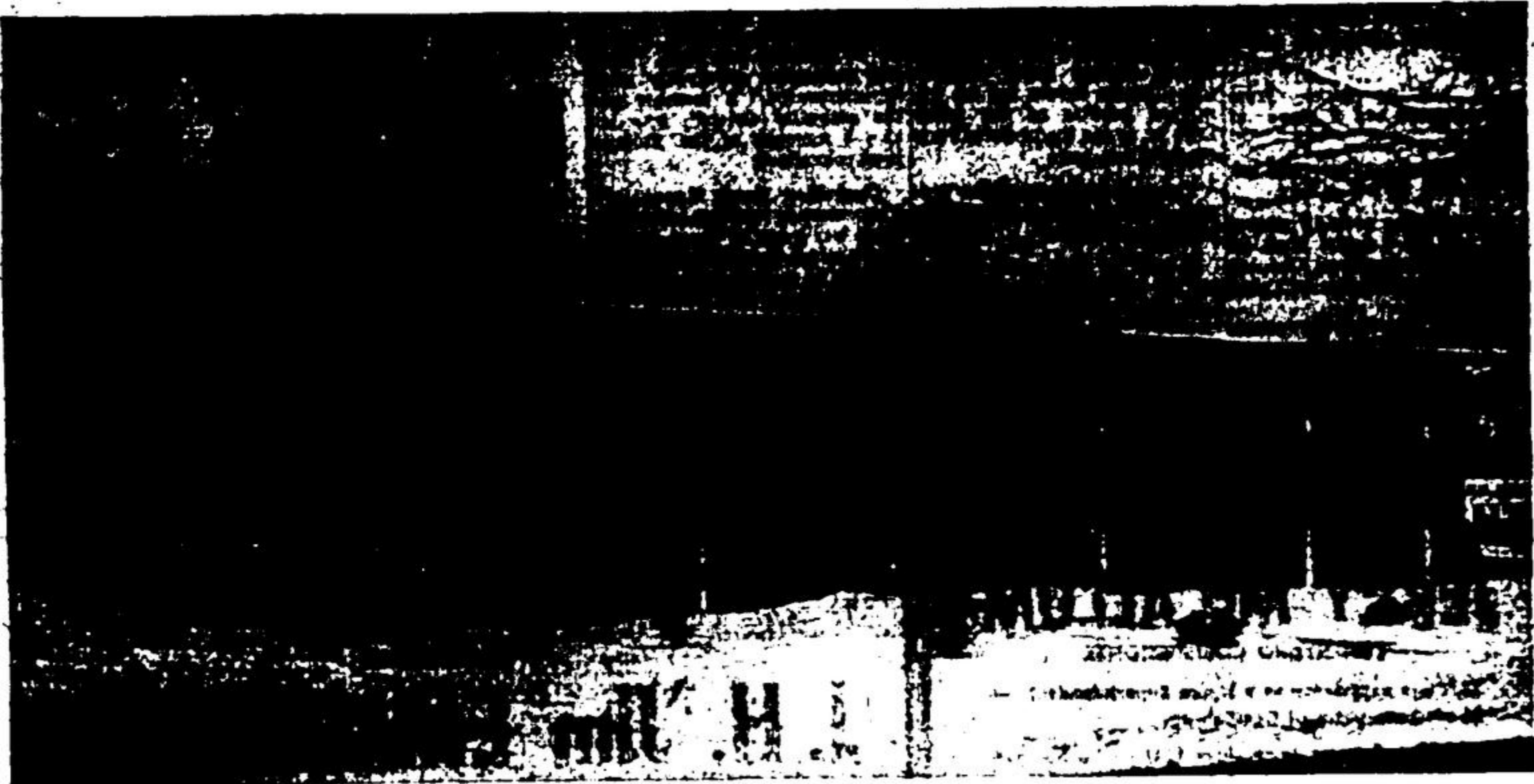
Mr. White said the consultant's report on the channel improvement for the area is expected soon.

Mr. White also reported that a draft engineering plan for Terra Cotta Park from Canadian Mitchell Associates was ex-

pected to be in the Authority's hands early next week.

He suggested that under the winter works program the authority could clear out the new entrance to the park and perhaps build the two parking lots and the entrance.

It was reported that a total of 1,000 cars had paid admission to the Terra Cotta Park this year.

The Jaycees believe that only by having an election for each council seat can the true voice of the people be heard, and it is our hope that there will be no acclamations this year.

We believe it is very important, particularly for an incumbent, for each candidate to know the amount of support he will get for his policies, either as shown by his record of previous years. This is best achieved by a contest at the polls and in order to obtain maximum success it is important that we, the voters, turn out in large numbers to show our wishes.

Much has happened in the past year around Georgetown and from current indications the coming year could show even greater changes. Let us all do our part to ensure the best possible representation by voting on December 6th.

The Georgetown Jaycees have discussed the municipal scene from time to time and, to start us all thinking, here are a few of the questions we will be asking the various candidates:

- 1 What is the complete story on Moore Park - what costs to the taxpayer will be involved in providing services? Will the bridge have to be widened at town expense?
- 2 What is your stand on road paving? Do you believe Georgetown should have a long term plan to pave and curb all streets instead of the present tar and gravel operation?
- 3 What is your plan regarding storm sewer improvement?
- 4 Are you in favour of a town manager?
- 5 Are you in favour of public attendance at all meetings of council and committees? If so what improvements would you make to ensure public knowledge of meeting dates and times?
- 6 Do you feel additional park or playground facilities are required and if so, what plans do you have in this regard?
- 7 Do you feel that current assessments are equitable and if not, what would you do regarding re-assessment?
- 8 What is your opinion regarding new Police facilities and if required, where should they be located? Is present protection adequate?
- 9 What is your feeling on the water tower question?
- 10 What are your thoughts regarding the possibility of electing council to a two year term on a staggered

basis so that at all times one half of council will be carrying forward to the next year?

The above are just a few things which the Jaycees feel merit some hearing as there appear to be different viewpoints. It is hoped that this will provide a basis for discussion and will stimulate other questions during the pre-election weeks so that a complete picture of each candidate's position may be presented to the voter.
