Most Valuable Player, Tost Gets Jewell Memorial Award

A Georgetown Juvenile pitcher, Mike Tost has been named the Most Valuable Player in the Georgetown Baseball Association. The announcement was made Saturday night at an annual dinner for Intermediate, Juvenile and Midget clubs and minor league coaches and managers. The affair was held in St. Alban's church hall, Glen Williams.

"Keep trying," was the message Halton Baseball Association past president Pete McMullen gave his audience. "Many times boys over 20 years of age are picked by major league affiliates so there is no reason to feel you've been passed by at this age," he said.

Tost was presented with his award by GHA president Bill Richmond who also manages the Juvenile club on which Tost starred. The MVP award is the Chick Jewell Memorial Trophy which was named for the late Chick Jewell, a former Georgetown Intermediate manager who died during a baseball game in Acton.

It was one of four presentations. Retiring councillor Bob Francis presented Georgetown's hurler Bernie Dore with his replica of the Chick Jewell Trophy which he won last year. Councillor Roy Hill presented Georgetown's dinner

Mr. McMullen, a past president of the Ontario Baseball Association, and a life member of the Halton group, told the guests that baseball is on its way back. Support the minors, he said, and you support baseball at all levels.

"Make sure of your education and don't let it take a back seat," he urged the players present.

Mr. McMullen was introduced by Bill Richmond who chaired the dinner.

Elmira Victory Gives Raiders Fifth Win

Georgetown Raiders notched their sixth win of the season Wednesday night following a 5-4 win over Elmira in an OHA Central Ontario Junior C League game. It was the second time Georgetown had downed the new Elmira entry in their six starts. Both were close contests.

Raiders had Elmira club three goals down at one point. They led 2-1 at the end of the first period, 4-2 after 40 minutes and scored early in the third when they owned their widest margin.

Paul Robinson, who paced his team with a pair of goals, drew first blood scoring from Bill Dwyer and Rod Presswood at 1:37. Elmira tied things at 4:05 on Long's goal from Veitch, but Robinson recaptured the advantage half way through the period from Presswood and Ron Norton.

Georgetown had a 2-1 lead until 15:54 of the middle period when Rick Maloney increased the buffer to 3 to 1 from Marao and Simon Llewellyn. Elmira's Powell registered his club's second goal from Yarr a minute later, but Doug Selby found the range in the final minute and counted Georgetown's fourth goal. Ron Lane and Dwyer assisted.

For the second game in succession Ron Lane triggered the winning goal, though it looked like so much insurance at the time. It came at 7:25 of the last frame from Selby and Norton and made the score 5-2. Goals by Long from McClure and Powell from McDonald for Elmira, at 9:25 and 14:55 respectively washed out most of the difference, but Lane's marker was one too many for the Elmira rally to erase.

Officials caught Elmira offenders 8 times, and Georgetown was asked for 5 penalties.

Milton Merchants held Georgetown Raiders to a 2-2 draw in a penalty studded Ontario Hockey Association Central Junior C game here Sunday afternoon.

A Georgetown walkaway that appeared to shape up in the first period, never came about as the game developed into an extension of the Milton-Georgetown playoff last spring.

Doug Selby maintained his scoring pace with Georgetown's first goal at 6:03 from Rick Maloney. Rod Presswood slipped in number two a little over thirty seconds later from Paul Robinson and the Raiders scoring was complete.

Milton got one of them back after a minute and 43 seconds in the second period when Gervais scored from Marshall. It wasn't until 11:23 of the third frame that visitors drew even, Hore, the marksmen, Wildfong the set up man.

Georgetown had the lion's share of the penalties with 20. Milton players were nicked for 14.

The tie made Georgetown's record 5 wins, a tie and a loss in seven starts for 11 points, best in the twelve team league. Milton is in third place.

They host Bramford this coming Sunday.

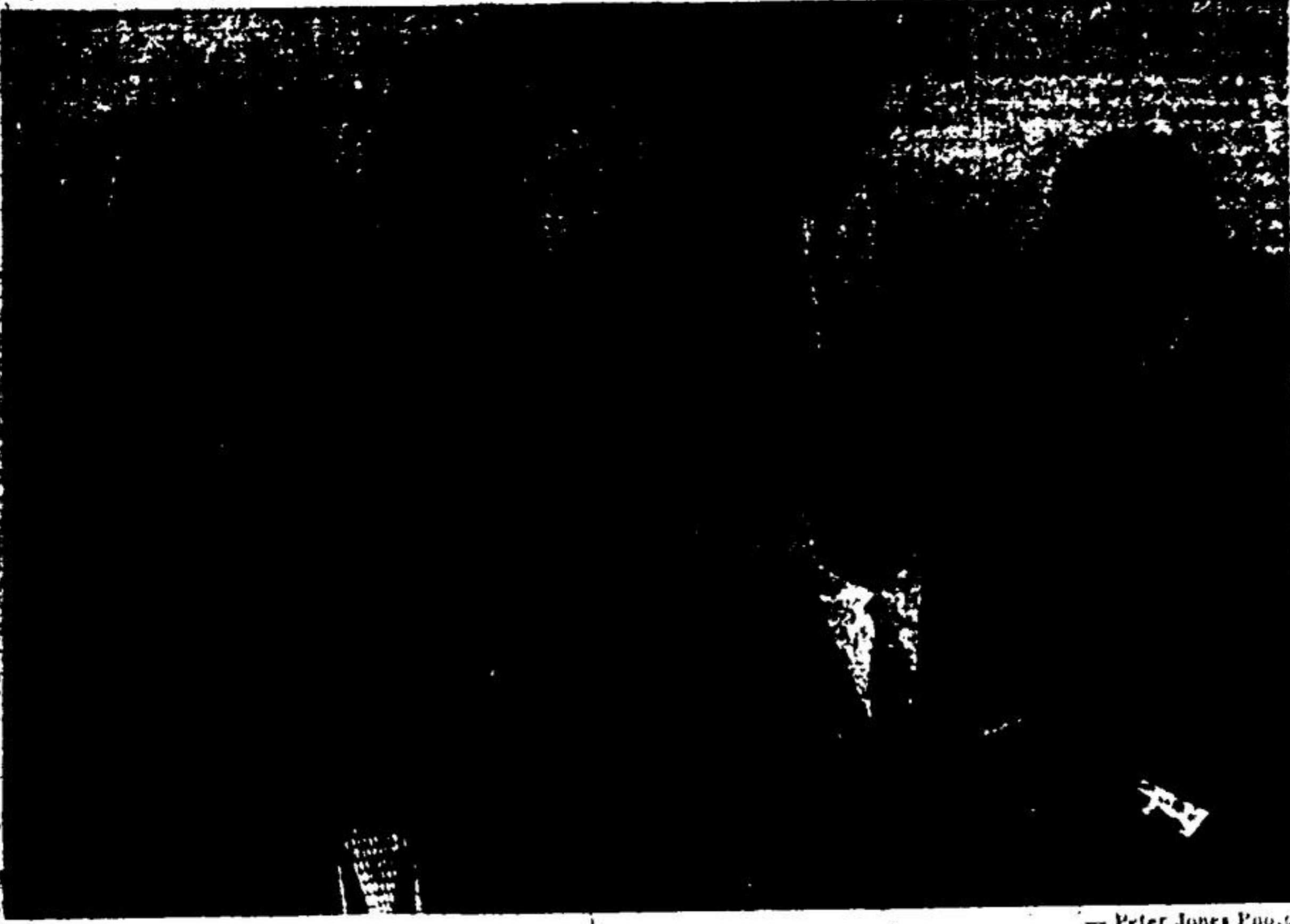
Emerging head and shoulders above the rest of the tired toilers when it was all over was Georgetown netminder Bob Cuthbert. The big Raider puck stopper tied himself in knots to preserve the deadlock, especially in the late stages when Milton had a series of labeled chances. Cuthbert made one of his best moves in the overtime period to stymie Merchant J. Marshall on a short breakaway.

Emotions erupted on the ice and in the crowd in the second period when Brent Telford of the Raiders and Milton's Legree were banished with game misconducts, and Bill Dwyer, Georgetown, and Currie of Milton.
