A driver and his passenger escaped with minor injuries when a car flipped over and landed upright in a two-car collision early Saturday morning.

Police said Eddie Hiss, 50 Sargent Road, suffered bumps and bruises, and the driver, Robert Crocker, 16 Sargent Rd., suffered bruises to his legs when the 1960 Volkswagen they were riding in rolled over.

The driver of the other car involved, John Wallace Rogers, 34 McGillivray Cres., was not hurt.

Police said the Crocker car had just entered the highway from Sinclair Ave. and was westbound when the accident happened. They said the Rogers car collided with the back end of the Crocker vehicle.

To the Mayor and Council, Town of Georgetown.

Gentlemen:

We have prepared the statement of estimated annual expenditures to finance the capital cost of the proposed Elevated Storage and Control System and the corresponding savings as a result of the proposed capital improvements per year direction of October 4th, 1965, and in this connection are pleased to submit the following for your consideration:

The annual expenditure in the capital cost and resultant saving is based on the following premises:

1. That approval for the project can be obtained from the Ontario Municipal Board.
2. That an additional loan of \$20,000 will be approved by the Minister. (At the time of this report, the Municipal Works Assistance Program has only earmarked a loan of \$100,000 for this project.)
3. That the project can be completed by April 1 so that the Provincial forgiveness factor can be utilized.

If all the above provisions are not carried out, there will be an additional cost of \$35,000 principal plus interest over the twenty-year financing period.

4. That the additional financing of debentures can be sold at par @ 5 1/2%.
5. The savings estimations are based on current operating costs which fluctuate from year to year with payroll and hydro rates.

An indirect factor to be considered is the fire insurance rating placed on the Town of Georgetown by the Canadian Underwriters Association. Although the present system is not affecting the current insurance rates, indications in municipalities which have used the proposed Elevated Storage and Control System, are that the presence of the Elevated Storage and Control System has been a factor in maintaining lower insurance rates for fire policies.

We are enclosing the attached statement showing the summary of the capital cost of the project together with the related schedules of annual cost and savings based on the above conditions.
