"Why should this council be dealing with business for next year in the dying moments of our tenure of office?" said the mayor.

The Hewson Powers proposal would rent the Delrex building for \$1125 monthly until the end of 1949, then for \$500 monthly unless and until a financial institution was secured as a sub-tenant. The present building would be sold to the Delrex firm for \$40,000. And Georgetown would own the new building at the end of 30 years.

Toronto. He cited 30 units per acre in Oakville, 60 units per acre in Scarborough, and only 40 per acre in Georgetown, as evidence they were not overloading the area.

Mrs. Rundle admitted there may have to be high rise apartments, but felt they should be in areas already zoned R4. "This way there would be no breaking faith with anyone."

Mrs. Rundle stated that there was a site for a twenty suite apartment on Water Street already excavated and should be investigated by the Kinamen.

"The high rise apartments may be lovely for those who live in them but what about those who live beside them?" she challenged. "The sunshine will be blocked out, and many of us have our living rooms at the back just to take advantage of the location." With only one access driveway planned, it will become a roadway right behind our yards," she continued. In conclusion Mrs. Rundle stated, "We are not asking favours, we are just asking the protection which a zoning by-law is supposed to afford the citizens."

Chairman Cass felt the Planning Board now has to face some of the most difficult decisions since its inception. "We can't keep sweeping the question of high rise apartments under the rug, it will have to be faced." He explained that they appreciated the fears of the ratepayers, however he asked for understanding for their position. "In other places the Planning Board has become so frustrated and ostracized, that the members quit, not only the knowledge and continuity lost, but the way was open for appointment filled by people with axes to grind and financial interests. We are here to protect everyone in the community," he continued.

A plan of overall high rise apartments will be drawn up and published the Board assured the ratepayers, and nothing can be done immediately, they were told.

On the question of the Kinamen Senior Citizens' project, Dean Taylor of the Kinamen Club pointed out that the building is only twenty feet above the ground, would demand no school facilities, and not increase traffic. "It is unfortunate that both applications were made at the same time," he went on. "I don't feel it is the thin edge of the wedge, since R4 permits only a height of thirty five feet, and anything higher requires special legislation." He pointed out that a former site kitty corner to the Memorial Park would have proved too costly to the town for services. The swamp would have added the cost by \$3,500, according to Mr. Taylor.

Jim Lyons, who has built homes in that area, contended that the sewers would be incapable of handling any greater load.

In answer to Mr. Cass' question Planning consultant Derek Little predicted a time lapse of seven months at least until all the steps in rezoning are covered.

"This makes clear to everyone, that regardless what the Planning Board does, there is no way that an immediate approval can be given," Mr. Cass summed up.

Since a more detailed estimate of costs for servicing the Kinamen project was felt necessary before the Board could form a definite opinion the application will be sent through the different municipal departments for their estimates and opinions. Following the processing of this application, it will come up again at another meeting.
