To Calgary Conference

Stewart Saxe first-year student at the University of Waterloo, will represent the University paper THE CORVPIHAUS, at the Canadian University Press conference in Calgary this Christmas.

Stewart set a rather unprecedented record this year by becoming news editor of the paper after only five weeks on the staff.

Canadian University Press is a national organization with a membership that includes almost every campus newspaper in Canada. A permanent office is maintained in Ottawa where facilities are available for the collecting and disbursing of news from member papers.

The Calgary conference, which lasts from Dec. 27 to Dec. 30, will discuss the aims and achievements of the organization and direct its future activities.

Tom Rankin, Editor-in-chief of THE CORVPIHAUS, will also be going to Calgary with Mr. Saxe.

The trip will be made by plane and will be financed by the University student council.

A Georgetown farm gained a \$1,200 sale, and a Georgetown sales firm paid \$1,450 for another animal at the Holstein Sale of Stars at the Royal Winter Fair. The sale established a new North American record average for the Holstein breed of \$3,277.00. This is also believed to be the world record for the Holstein breed.

The twenty six animals sold brought a total of \$33,225. The two sales in which Georgetown interests were involved moved a five year old cow from the herd of A. H. McKane, Georgetown, to the Kenneth Eckford farm at Foresters Falls, Ont. and a milking female from the farm of Paul Ekstein, Toronto, to Rockwood International Ltd. of Georgetown. Rockwood International made the purchase for a French buyer.

The highest price paid at the record breaking sale was \$13,200 by F. Roy Ormlston of Brooklyn, Ont., to Floyd and Orton Eby of Ebydale Farm, Kitchener, for a six year old cow who was the Grand Champion at the Canadian National Exhibition in 1964.
