

Varn Need One Number For Social Insurance

The Unemployment Insurance Commission said today that the current registration for the Canada Pension Plan is apparently leading many Canadians who already have a Social Insurance Number to apply for a second one. The Commission emphasized that the one number provides identity for both Canada Pension Plan and unemployment insurance purposes and that the individual must not have more than one number.

Those who apply more than once may be building up future difficulties for themselves in regard to payments from either plan. They may find that they have created more than one "account" for their contributions and thus have trouble obtaining their full entitlement when the time comes to obtain benefits.

The UIC noted that every effort is made to avoid assigning more than one number to an individual. However, when the particulars given on one application are not identical to those given on an earlier application, a second number will be issued.

For the individual who already has more than one Social Insurance Number, the Commission says the solution is simple. He should report the problem to the nearest UIC office, bringing with him, or mailing, all the Social Insurance Number cards in his possession. The Commission will cancel the later numbers and supply a new Social Insurance Number card if the original one has been misplaced.

While it is an offense for a person to knowingly apply for more than one number, it is recognized that most multiple applications are made inadvertently. The Commission stressed that its immediate interest is to have those who contribute to either the Canada Pension Plan or unemployment insurance to do so under one — and only one — Social Insurance Number.

If the 1966 council is composed of men, who have not an established ill-will toward me, without interfering with their independence, then, I say our work in Council will be more easy and pleasant.

During the past year it is apparent that Georgetown is getting closer to industrial expansion. In the near future we expect positive action in this direction. I hope and expect that soon there will be Georgetown employment for all Georgetown citizens. The best incentive to establishment of industry is a low tax-rate.


The finalizing of the purchase of the property for Georgetown's 1967 Centennial project has been completed and Georgetown people now, and in the future, from the senior citizens to the youth of the community may enjoy a place of natural beauty, a place of good clean sport and amusement, yes a place of joy for young and old to ever go.

I am offering my services to the Town of Georgetown for the year 1966. If for any reason the electors decide that my services are no longer required, I assure you there will be no animosity in my heart whatsoever. But if my municipal record commends itself to you, if you think I have acted honestly, fearlessly, and independently, for what I believe to be in the best interests of the people of the town of Georgetown; if you think I will continue to enact sound municipal legislation, then I shall appreciate your support at the polls Monday, December 6th.
