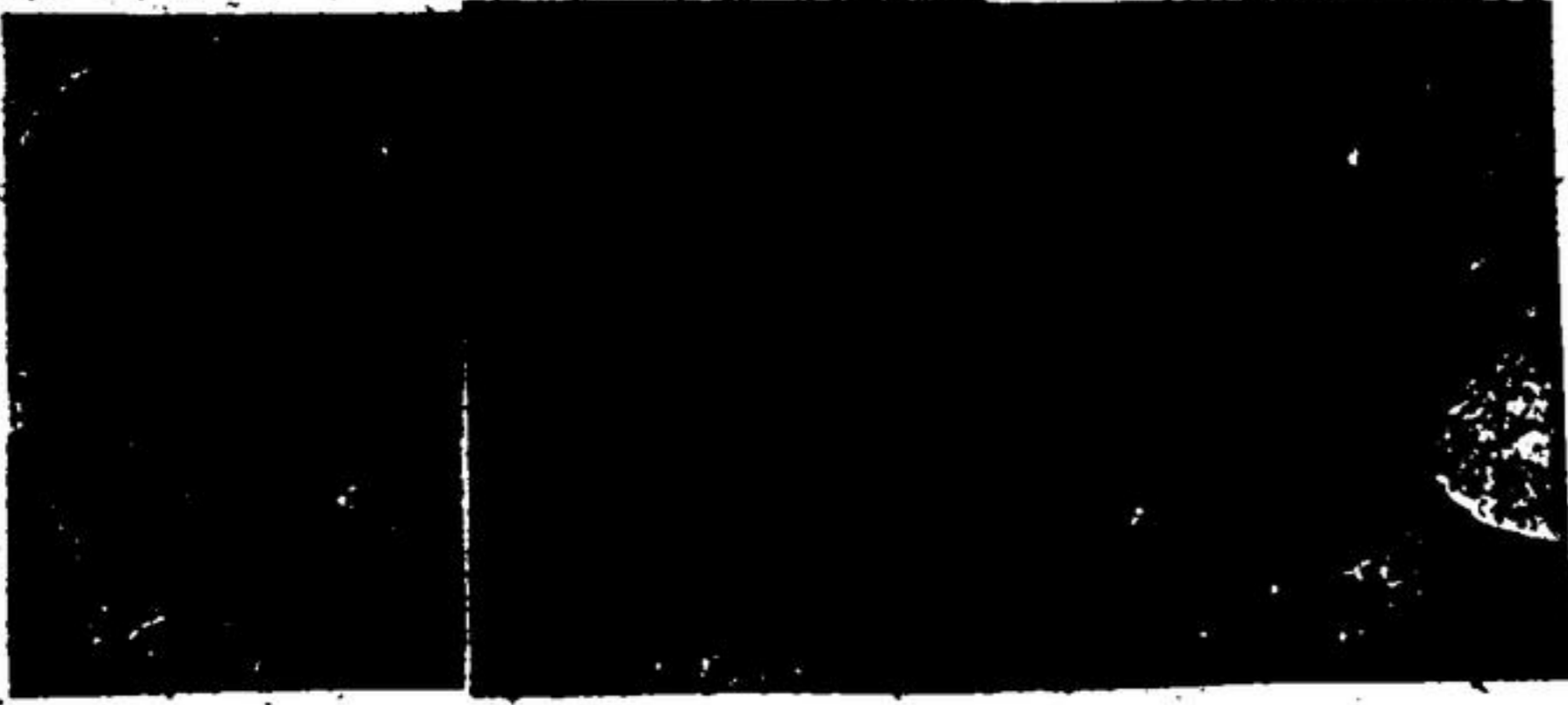


SIX SEEK FOUR SEPARATE SCHOOL SEATS

Clure Dolson Ends Service 12 Years on School Board

Twelve years of service to the Chingusouy Township public school board by a Georgetown man came to an end when Clure Dolson failed to appear during the Chingusouy nominations period in Saeigrove municipal hall Friday.

Mr. Dolson's name appeared on the list of nominations, but to be effective the candidate himself must be present at some time during the hour-long period.

One other change was the nomination for Ward I of a former councillor, John S. Dunn, of Saeigrove. He will oppose Gordon Lowe for that seat.

At the close of nominations Friday, Reeve Clark was acclaimed to his 14th and 15th years as head of the municipality. Deputy-reeve Edward Blair will be opposed by Ronald Weir, who has three years of previous council service.

In Ward 2, the incumbent Frank Lyons will be opposed by Murray Judge, also of Chellenham. He is making his first run for public office.

The incumbent member for Ward 3, Aldo Ferri received an acclamation for his second two-year term.

Ward 4 will be represented again by veteran campaigner Harold Wilson, who also received an acclamation.

There is to be a contest in Ward 5 between the incumbent James Cahcart and Tim Millroy, both representing Bramalea.

With one exception there was an acclamation across the board for the seats on the area public school board.

Returned by acclamation were Gordon Catton, present chairman; Fred Kee, present vice chairman; Joe Sherman, Neil Hoyer, a newcomer to this board received an acclamation when Clure Dolson failed to appear.

In Ward 5, Bramalea, the present member Robert Tate, is to be opposed by Tom Nesbitt.

Hopie Doubleheaders Correct 'Meter Lurch'

The automobiles have won the battle of the parking meters — but it appears the town's public works staff will win the war.

Town workmen reduced the number of meter posts downtown to half, and retreated about six inches from curbs last week in an attempt to put an end to the collisions between cars and meters which have been a source of extra work for the works department.

The constant bumping of meters by parking cars bent them on angles and made the lines of meters look like files of staggering soldiers.

"There were just too many knocked down, we had to do something," foreman Frank Morelle told The Herald. "These new posts should put an end to our replacement problems."

The new posts are shielded at the bottom by a length of steel pipe. The meters are mounted two on a post. Their height has also been reduced for convenience and appearance. Painting the posts dark green will complete the project.

"We had all the material and the coupling to mount the meters double in stock so the cost was negligible," Mr. Morelle said.

Kinnette Gift Earmarked for Training Institute

National Kin vice-president Howard Taggart, Q.C. was in Georgetown Thursday Nov. 11 to speak to the Georgetown Kinette Club at their meeting in Holy Cross Church auditorium.

Also at the meeting were two former conveners from Stratford and Niagara Falls, as well as Kinettes from Brampton, Streetsville, Oakville, Milton, Guelph and Preston. The current convener Pat Melkie of London was unable to attend.

Acting on behalf of the Georgetown Kinettes, president Mrs. Mona Milne presented a cheque to the national vice-president which will in turn be given to Dick Hendek of Regina, chairman of the Kinmen anniversary project. Kinmen across Canada have decided to erect an institute in Toronto for the training of persons to work with mentally retarded children. It will be completed by 1970 and will commemorate the Kinmen Golden Jubilee Year.

The colours of Kin were the theme for the evening. Yellow and mauve mums decorated the head table and candles were placed before diners. The Catholic Women's League catered. A raffle was won by a Streetsville guest and a member of the host club.

Other projects being planned by the local club are a children's Christmas party, a Kin party smorgasbord, the sale of nuts for Christmas, and repairing toys for welfare baskets. A fund has been set up to defray the costs of those who attend conventions and in support of this each Kinette has until the end of April to raise \$5 by her own talent. Chairmen have also been appointed for next spring's mammoth bridge and Kinette Cruise.

Switch Apartment Site When Zoning Interfere

Undered by zoning regulations from making an immediate start on a planned apartment building for senior citizens, the Kinmen Club have come up with a new plan.

They are now seeking to acquire land west of Park Public School, portions of which are owned by the town and by Esqueping Township.

Monday, council agreed to supply necessary sewer and water services if the club goes ahead with its plan. The apartment building would take part of a property which has been used as a baseball diamond by sports groups. It is in close proximity to Georgetown Hospital.
