**LET'S PLAY BRIDGE**

I would like to show you a hand that occurred during a rubber bridge match last week. This hand contains two interesting points on the play of the cards.

Declarer East, North-South vulnerable.

North  
S-Q 8 6 5 3  
H-Q 6  
D-A 9 7  
C-K 3 2

West  
S-K 8 4  
H-J 8 5 4

The bidding

East South West North  
Pass 1 S Pass 3 S  
Pass 4 S All Pass

West led the two of diamonds and dummy was spread. What disappointment! North South have points enough for game but the hands have exactly the same shape. If either had had one more heart and one less diamond or club this would be a wrap up.

With the present hands it looked like four losers for sure. First thought was to try and get rid of a trump loser. If West has the doubleton king of trump, he might be tempted to play low. Mind you he shouldn't play the king from king spot but he might. The first diamond trick was won in South's hand. Declarer led a small spade. West came up with the king but also it wasn't a doubleton.

One chance gone. West led another diamond which was won in dummy. If the ace of spades and the king of hearts are in the same hand maybe something can be done.

Declarer postpones the leading of trump to take three rounds of clubs. Now trumps are led and east is in with the ace. After taking the diamond queen, East must lead heart or give declarer a ruff and a sluff.

Without hesitating East led a heart, but declarer had made

up his mind. The heart three was played from South's hand and the queen won in dummy. Perhaps South was lucky to find the cards placed just so, but he was unlucky to find that dummy and he had the same shape.

If the cards have to lie a certain way in order to make the contract, then assume that they are the way you want them and play accordingly.
