

Fire Prevention Poster Winner Feted at Dinner

About 30 firefighters and dignitaries in Milton Fire Hall on Tuesday evening, November 22, paid tribute to the two top winners of the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau's 1965 poster competition — Cynthia Lee of Acton and Daniel Winslow of Oakville. Only Georgetown-area people to share in the awards were Larry Cunningham of Norval who received "honourable mention."

Named top artists in a fire prevention poster competition entered by over 1,000 of Halton's Grade 5 students, Danny and Cynthia were awarded the Halton Mutual Fire Insurance Company trophies which their school will retain for one year. They were also awarded engraved desk pens sets and a certificate in recognition of their outstanding achievement, by members of the Bureau.

BONDS ARE PRIZES
Both their posters will be entered in an Ontario-wide contest sponsored by the Ontario Fire Chief's Association next year. The top prizes in that competition are \$100 bonds.

The two winners sat at the table at last week's banquet, flanked by Bureau Chairman E. W. Miller of Oakville, M.P.P. George A. Kerr, Ontario Fire Marshal's Office, Canadian Association of Fire Chiefs general manager Henry Arnold, Ontario Fire Chief's Association president Lou Carriere of Cornwall, and president Norman Cantelon and inspector Robert Shortill of the Halton Mutual Fire Insurance Co.

George Kerr said he couldn't think of a better way to impress the dangers of fire on young people, than this particular competition.

Other speakers brought greetings from their organizations, and praised the Bureau for its year-round effort to acquaint the public about fire safety.
