Trouten A Hit, Reviewer Says Of 'Most Happy Fella'

Glowing praise for the performance of Tom Trouten in Hamilton Theatre Inc's production of Most Happy Fella was contained in a review in last week's Burlington Gazette.

Yom, whose musical career has included the leads in Pyjama Game in Kitchener and Kiss Me Kate in Hamilton, as well as a chorus role in South Pacific at O'Keefe Centre, moved to Burlington from Georgetown a few years ago. He has been a member of several local Rotary Club reviews and returned to this town in the Hospital Auxiliary musicale.

The Burlington reviewer comments: "The combination of an excellent singer and a first rate actor, is a comparatively rare one. A man who has come to possess both these qualities is Tom Trouten and he proved it conclusively in Most Happy Fella."

Containing some great music, it is, perhaps, as near light opera as a musical comedy will ever get, and if it is to succeed the male lead role of Tony must be played with strength and compassion, dignity and conviction, sympathy and understanding. Tom Trouten brought all the necessary qualities to Tony, and as a result, helped make it a hit show. His was a performance that I, for one, would rate as one of the best seen in all the many IYI productions.

The show concludes in run this Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Many Georgetown people have seen or are planning to see it.

The Frank Loesser musical, which had a long run on Broadway includes such songs as "Joey," "Standing on the Corner," "Big D," and "My Heart is so full of You."
