Raiders Wait Until Final Minutes Press Preston

Georgetown Raiders recovered from a disastrous first period in Preston Saturday night in time to snatch a 4-3 triumph from Preston Pals in an OHA Junior C game.

Preston rocked their lofty visitors with a 3-1 first period lead and it stood up until the dying minutes when Georgetown struck for two quick desperation goals, the last one with 18 seconds left to play.

A Raider defenseman Phil Marso whipped in Rick Malone's pass with the game 3 minutes old to jump Raiders into a 1-0 lead, but Preston came on strong to take a head lock on the game late in the period. Nichol, from Peterson, Burghart, and Russell, both unassisted, did the Preston tripping work.

Georgetown took a 4-2 lead early in the third when Bill Dwyer registered his goal from Robinson and Huddall. Ronson pulled his club to within one goal again scoring from Hazzant, but Mike Cummins recaptured Raiders' 2 goal cushion with five minutes left, unassisted.

Georgetown's entry in the International Hockey League gathered two more wins in as many games during the week.

G. Bell of Brampton owns the top goal tending honours to date while S. Frankfurter, Georgetown, and B. Wolting of Guelph are tied for second.



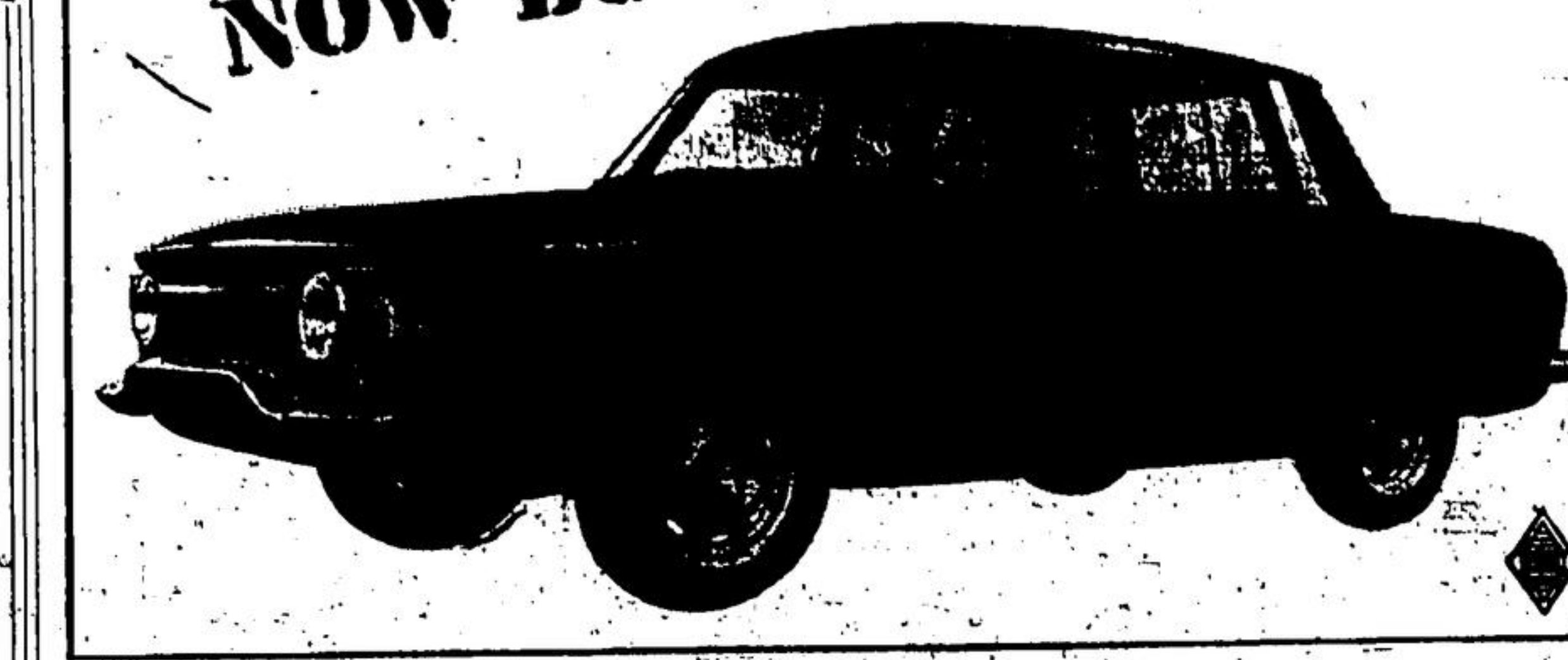
