

Blood Clinic, Nursing Course Upcoming Events for Red Cross

The dates for three blood donor clinics to be held in Georgetown in 1966 have been announced by the Georgetown branch of the Canadian Red Cross Society. Next year's clinics will be held on February 14, June 8 and October 17.

Other services currently occupying local Red Cross branch people include an upcoming Home Nursing course, gifts for the senior citizens at their dinner and water safety promotion.

The fifteen week course will start Monday January 10 at the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Building with Mrs. M. D. Simpson M. N. the instructor.

Gifts are being wrapped by a committee to be presented to all senior citizens attending the annual Rotary Club Christmas Dinner next Monday. The chairman, Mrs. E. J. Atkinson

and her committee also will make visits to some shut-ins who are 80 years plus. The Red Cross branch is interested in learning of any such person and information should be directed to the committee chairman.

Winter Water Safety posters have been distributed over the schools and are shown all over town and district to warn THE PARENTS to keep the children away from "thin ice." Already several DROWNINGS have been reported.

To emphasize these dangers the Georgetown Figure Skating Club and this committee are making preparations to have a float in the Lions Santa Claus Parade.

One of the main problems discussed at a Water Safety Committee meeting at the Red Cross Toronto HQ Mrs. Conda Newhof attended, was "how to teach

the boating-hunters to warn them of the dangers of being on the water in a boat." This season again there were far more hunters killed by drowning than by shotgun.

Excellent swimming programs exist for the handicapped and also for the mentally retarded children. It seems that these children can learn to swim just as well as the others, if only

they can get the right guidance and in water with an 82 degree temperature.

Established Glen Apple Firm Forty Years Ago

A Glen Williams businessman since 1926, John F. Lindner, 78, died at his home in Norval November 27.

Mr. Lindner established Apple Products (Glen Williams) Ltd., which supplies apple pie filling to the restaurant, hotel and wholesaling trade.

He was born in Weston, was educated in Burlington where his family moved when he was a boy and later started a food processing business in Toronto with his father, about 1910. Later they operated a similar business in Brampton until he established the Apple Products firm in the Glen. Since then he had been a Norval resident.

Prominent in Brampton Masonic circles, he was first principal of Peel Chapter R.A.M. in 1930 and master of Ionic Lodge No. 200 AF & AM in 1936.

He leaves his wife, Winnifred Irene Hill, three children John B. Lindner, Burlington, William S. Lindner, Brampton and Mrs. Ivan Ashbury, Peterborough, and six grandchildren.

Rev. Robert Duncanson of Norval Presbyterian Church conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home. Interment was at Bethel Cemetery near Severn Bridge where Mr. Lindner had his summer home.

Write-In Vote Unusual Chinguacousy Feature

A six year veteran of Chinguacousy council, Frank Lyons went down to defeat at the hands of Murray Judge, a newcomer in township politics, in a lightly contested Chinguacousy election Saturday. Mr. Judge's advantage was 86 votes.

Reeve Cyril Clark was returned by acclamation on nomination day.

Returned for a second two-year term as deputy-reeve was Edward Blair of Huttonville, who polled 2,165 votes against his opponent Ronald Weir of Bramalea 1,400.

Gordon Lowe of Snelgrove, who has served the township for

six years, retained his seat in ward one against three-time councillor John S. Dunn.

In ward five contest for council, incumbent James Cathart retained his seat by an almost three-to-one vote over Tim Milloy. Cathart polled 1,427 votes to Milloy's 572.

An unusual aspect of the election was the write-in vote for ward five in the contest for Area Public School Board. Tom Nesbitt, who had been an announced candidate for school board and then withdrew a week before the election but not before the ballot had been printed with his name on them, received 406 votes against Robert Tate 1,219

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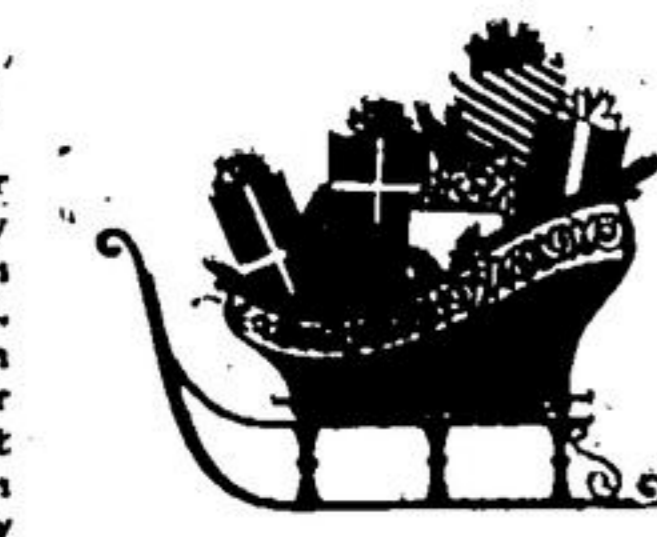
