### Lacks Facilities County Jail Grand Jury Finds

While County Councilors spend whole meetings debating the progress in their attempts to have a new regional detention centre built to accommodate Milton prisoners, Grand Jurors inspecting the present County Jail in Milton keep finding fault with the outdated facilities.

A grand jury comprising seven men from the county inspected Milton's public facilities of each sitting of the supreme court in the county. This week the December sittings opened and the grand jury found five serious faults at the Milton jail.

They called the old court house jail "completely inadequate" following Monday inspection, and listed five improvements needed, saying with "we highly recommend that a new jail should be constructed without delay."

The following were their recommendations:

- (1) There is no provision here for segregation of pre-trial prisoners, short term offenders, and those awaiting transportation to other institutions.
- (2) We recommend that each new offender be supplied with clean bedding on entry and that this bedding should be changed on a regular basis.
- (3) We recommend that some steps be taken to improve recreation and library facilities.
- (4) We find that the staff are carrying out their duties under very adverse conditions aggravated by the high turnover of staff and we feel that serious consideration be given to improved remuneration.
