



A Plywood Toy For a Little Boy Easy One Night Project for Xmas

Two pieces of fir plywood 10" x 20" and one piece of fir plywood 12" x 13" are the major sections of this popular toy. Scraps for the wheel (or better still an old baby-carriage or scooter wheel) and four pieces of light framing complete the materials list.

The erection sequence is —
1. Cut out the bottom and handles and join, drill for the wheels — don't forget the small triangular blocks to keep the wheels square and give further support to the axle. Glue and screw the bottom handles together.
2. Next cut out the sides. It is suggested that the sides be painted before fastening to the handles. The end piece can be fitted in more easily after the sides are on and correct angles taken for the 2" x 2" stiffeners.
3. Use 1/2" waterproof glue for plywood and paint with a good quality exterior type paint.
