



PLYWOOD CAROLLER BRINGS GOOD CHEER

These 2 foot high figures, nicely spot-lit on your lawn or in a snow bank could be made in half a dozen different versions, differently coloured. Assembled in a group they would like a group of carollers.

Notice that the figures can be cut out of a piece of fir plywood about 3 square — which means that one four by eight

sheet of waterproof glue fir plywood (and waterproof glue is essential) will give you eight figures.

Bright clear contrasting colours are needed to make the figures stand out. Use enamel after a primer coat has been applied.

Integrate Donatar Pensions With Government Plan

Agreement has been reached on the integration of the Donatar Limited negotiated pension plan with the Government plan, it was announced this week. One of Georgetown's major industries is the Donatar costing mill on Rosetta St.

The announcement was made jointly by James M. Buchanan, regional director of the United Papermakers and Paperworkers who is chairman of the union side of Donatar's Joint Pension Plan Committee, and Gordon Y. Harrison, Donatar's Director of Labour Relations.

Under the agreement, employee contributions to the plan will be reduced to four per cent of earnings from five, and total retirement income will be increased.

The agreement provides for increased participation by the union in administration, and makes special provision for persons retiring during the next three years.

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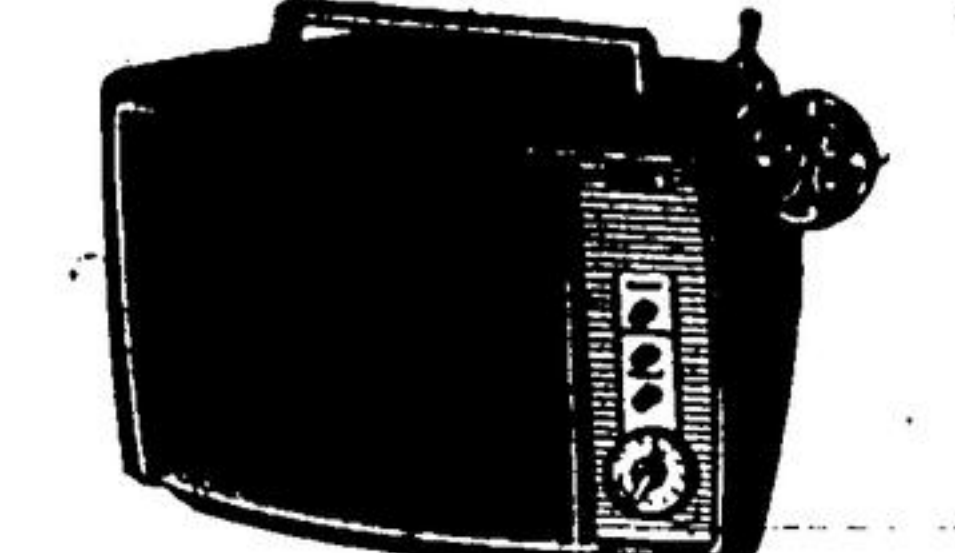


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
