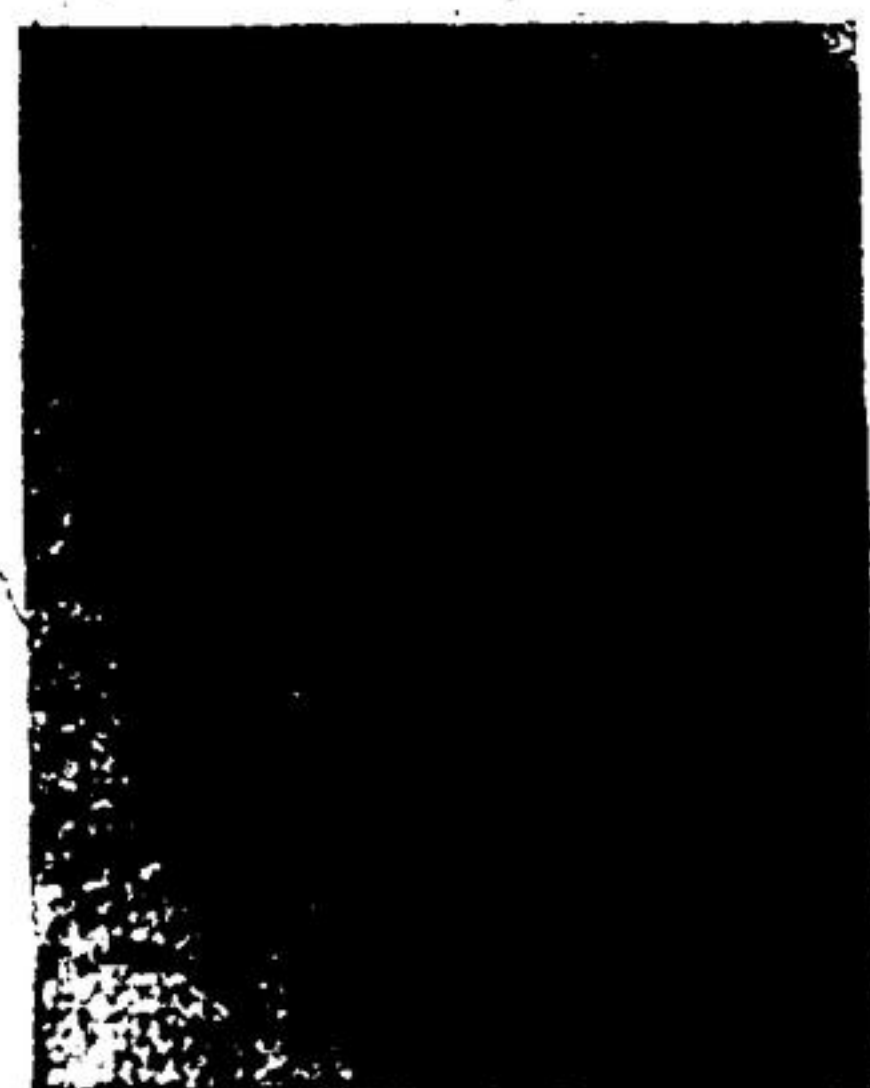

Says Water Tower Not Needed For Georgetown

Dear Mr. Editor:
The taxpayers of Georgetown should be asking themselves very seriously at this time, how much more they are willing to pay on the mill rate for the next year and in the years to come.

We are at present committed to spend nearly \$200,000 for the construction of a new public school, the cost of which is only initial to the cost of equipping and starting it. This school MUST be provided.

We are also committed to over \$100,000 to be spent on a water purification plant, and the costs for this could well exceed the estimate figure.

We have road conditions throughout town that are going to require extensive upkeep during the next year, more storm sewers are required and there could be other emergency commitments over which the town has no control.

Now, some members of this council are trying to saddle the taxpayer with another debentured 20-year expenditure of over \$300,000 for an overhead water tower.

The latest brochure issued by the town to advertise it says in regard to water

"An adequate supply of water is provided from three municipally owned deep wells.

There has NEVER been any restriction on the commercial or residential use of water.

Although the present consumption is only 1.5 millions gallons per day, THE PUMPING CAPACITY is 3.4 million gallons per day.

From these figures it can be readily seen that our sources of water supply are more than adequate even if we do have a substantial increase of industry in the town.

An engineer from the Procter and Medfern company of engineers in Toronto, stated at a council session several months ago in answer to a question from Mayor Gibbons, that while a water tower was advantageous it was not a necessity in view of the adequate water supply.

This issue will be heard before the Ontario Municipal Board in the council chamber on Tuesday, December 21st.

All taxpayers that can possibly attend should be there and if possible make submissions to the Board.

Three questions of utmost importance.

How many of this year's council were working for the town and the taxpayer's interests and how many for their own or someone else's interests?

How has the individual council member stood in regard to labor, especially to see that our resident unemployed got the preference for town employment?

Who in council has had the guts to fight most in the taxpayer's interests?
