

Third NHL Draftee Joins Some Kid Hockey Players Georgetown Junior Raiders Moved As Teams Balanced

With the addition of Terry Lane, Georgetown Raiders have now scored three of the five local players drafted by National Hockey League clubs two years ago back into the field.

Lane, a high points man with Georgetown Midgets when they won their first Ontario title a few seasons back, joined the Raiders on the weekend after allowing an arm fracture time to mend properly.

He joins defense player Rod Frenwood and forward Mike Cummins as the three Raiders who were picked up by NHL clubs in that historic draft session of June, 1963, when they were all members of the same Midget team along with Wayne Davison, and Al Blair.

Lane and Blair were picked by Boston Bruins, Cummins by New York, Frenwood by Montreal, and Davison was Chicago Black Hawks' selection.

It was the first time in the history of the drafts that five of one minor hockey team had been grabbed by the NHL.

Al Blair is currently playing with Brampton 7-Ups which runs out all five drafts, playing hockey for their home area this year, but don't be too surprised if the number grows to four. Wayne Davison who sat out last year may still appear in a Raider suit before the season's out.

The increased Raider strength showed Sunday when the red and white crew clicked four times in the third period with-out a reply to silence Hanover 9-2.
