Pontiacs Still Breezing Win 2, Tie 1 in Week

Georgetown Pontiacs against the Hespeler Bantams here Tuesday December 14 came up with a 2-2 victory. The locals got two in the first stanza when Wiles scored from Fowler and Hay at 2:35 and again, on a passout from Llewellyn at 9:57.

The second produced 5 goals. Jean Hespeler got their only two. Fowler from Inglis at 2:35 Nash and Inglis combined at 11:55, and Hay from Kuzack and Fogal at 13:00.

The locals added four more in the third. McNally from Llewellyn and Wiles then Fowler from Nash at 7:30. Nash from Fendley and Fowler, and to close out, Fendley unassisted at the period's end.

These two goals scored by Hespeler were the most by any team so far against the locals in regular play.

The Pontiacs against Acton on December 15th came home with a 6-0 victory, their eighth in a row. Georgetown notched

two in the first, McNally from Llewellyn and Fogal at 2:15 and Hay at 10:55 from Kuzack. No score in the second but four in the third; Nash from Fendley and Fowler at 8:35; Wiles from Llewellyn at 8:10; McNally from Fogal closed out the scoring.

Georgetown Bantams were held to a two all tie in Brampton on Sunday December 19th. In the first period the Pontiacs went into a lead on a goal by Fowler unassisted by Wiles at 5:08.

Fowler put Georgetown two up when he notched another at 4:45 of the second period assisted by Wiles and Hay. This was the extent of Georgetown's effort.

Brampton got their first at 13:55 of the second and the equalizer at 8:03 of the third. The Pontiacs made a belated effort towards the end of the period but to no avail as Brampton held up for a tie.

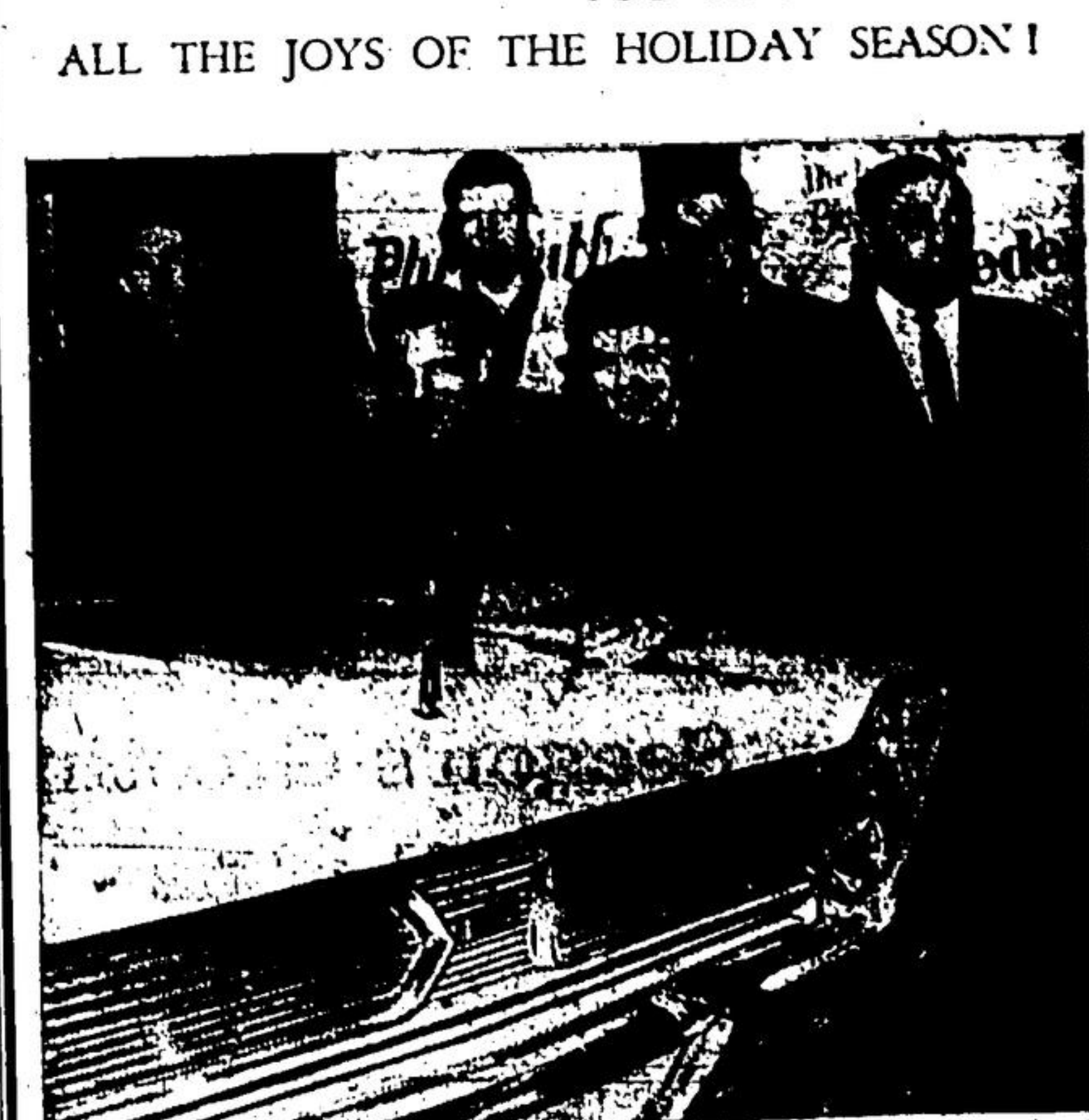
