Al Ferri Now Member Of Apple Growers Committee

A well-known Georgetown area apple grower, Al Ferri of Norval, has been elected to the committee of District 1 of the Ontario Apple Producers. District 1 includes Lincoln, Welland, Wentworth, Halton, Peel and York counties.

Mr. Ferri was one of five men named to the committee at an election meeting. Others elected are Art Kemp Burlington; Frank Richardson Mount Hope; Henry Frael, Niagara-on-the-Lake; Art Pengilly, Meadowvale. Mr. Kemp was named chairman of the group and will serve as representative on the Ontario Apple Producers Marketing Board until August 1969.

The meeting which saw an attendance of nineteen growers taking an interest in the affairs of the apple promotion program, had opportunity to ask questions regarding the function of the program over the past season. A financial statement was presented by chairman, Art Kemp, showing an income from fees of almost \$117,000 for the past year. Of this amount, almost \$80,000 was spent on apple promotion, with the remainder being carried over to this year's budget.

It might be noted that the Board now has the power to take court action against producers that do not report their

sales and make payments of their fees. This is the only way such a plan can work.

Halton's Agricultural Representative, Henry Stanley, commenting on the meeting said, "It is too bad however, that in a district comprising about five hundred apple producers, only nineteen have an opinion to express regarding this Apple Promotion Plan. After hearing all the whining on the street corners and the talking behind backs, the rumors that growers didn't have a fair chance when this plan came in to being, we wonder why only nineteen growers have an opinion to express or an interest at this time."

"We hope that in future growers will keep in touch with their representatives and try to get something out of this Promotion Plan, rather than keeping up their constant complaining. Just because you may be a farmer doesn't mean that everyone will cater to each little whim you may have," he said.
