Halton and Peel Will Discuss Regional Jail

After weeks of turmoil, the controversial Regional jail question seems to have been settled. At Tuesday's meeting Halton County Council received assurance from Peel County that they were willing to negotiate immediately on plans for the proposed jail to serve both counties.

Reporting on a meeting with Allan Grossman, Minister of Reform Institutions, Reeve Coulter of Nasagawaya, pointed out that the approval, and the grants would be the same whether Halton joined with Peel or with Hamilton-Wentworth.

However, the Assistant Deputy Minister Mr. Fenfold, felt that over a twenty year period the cost of the Peel-Halton complex would be slightly less than the originally proposed Hamilton-Wentworth scheme.

The Minister forecast a completion date of two years, and pointed out that in any event it would take no longer than it would with Hamilton-Wentworth.

Reeve Coulter, chairman of the jail committee noted it was unfortunate that the maximum and minimum requirements of the Department had not been known earlier in the year. Some of the information the Committee had at the beginning of the year has now been changed.

Closing the discussion, a resolution from Peel County recommending immediate negotiations with Halton, was read to Council.

Remanded Till January Assault-Robbery Charge

A 20 year old Georgetown man was remanded in custody last week to January for sentencing after he pleaded guilty to a charge of beating and robbing a 78 year old woman.

He also pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while his license was under suspension.

Mrs. Isabella Hogg of R. R. 2 Norval, told the court she was walking home after attending Georgetown Fall Fair October 2 when a car stopped and the accused "got out, grabbed my purse and pushed me to the ground." The purse contained \$14.

The accused's arrest came after a chase from Highway 7 into the Hornby area.

Port Credit police made the pick-up in the Highway 27 area.

"Martin House" Perpetuates Milton Pioneer Family Name

The new Halton Centennial Manor adjoining the present one, will be known as "Martin House." It was decided at Halton County Council this week.

"It is not only in honour of Dr. Martin, who has worked so hard both on this building, and on the original one," explained the Warden, "but it is also meant to honour the Martin family, the oldest family in Milton."

The Warden reminded Council that the Martin family settled Milton, and established the first mill, with the town becoming known as mill-town, or Milton.

There was not one dissenting vote, and "Martin House" was adopted unanimously.

The five retiring members of County Council are Dr. Carl Martin, Reeve of Milton, Roy Goodwin deputy reeve of Acton, Dr. E. Young, deputy reeve of Nasagawaya, Lester Whiting, deputy reeve of Oakville, and John Elliott, reeve of Georgetown.

A thank-you note from Anne Marchmont, on behalf of the Grade eleven and twelve Georgetown High School students who visited County Council last month, brought a chuckle from County Councillors, when she reminded Warden Merry that he had promised 36 students mementoes.

"We haven't any Halton County pens at the moment," commented the Warden, "but we'll certainly send them to the Georgetown students as soon as we have."
