## Meet Dundas First Time Raiders Triumph 6-3

Georgetown Raiders, working hard on constructing another extended win streak, locked up their third victory in a row in Dundas Tuesday night, Dec. 21st, since taking a 5-1 jolting from Milton Merchants two weeks ago.

Raiders finished with a flurry to double up the tough Dundas club 6-3. Other wins in the current streak include triumphs over Orangeville and Hagersville.

Dundas had Raiders deadlocked early in the final period, but a three goal eruption in a span of less than two minutes by Georgetown shook them off.

Paul Robinson came through with the winner on a solo at 5:32 of the third.

Red Presswood insured the 2 points with a pair of goals right on the heels of that one, the first at 6:30 from Don Norton, and the second, Georgetown's last, at 7:25, from Bill Dwyer.

It was Dwyer who started the scoring from Paul Robinson with the game just 54 seconds old. It took Dundas eight minutes to get that one back, James picking up an opening in Cuthbert's umbrella with Newton helping out. But Georgetown left the ice with a goal advantage. Ron Lane converted brother Terry's pass into Raiders' second marker with four minutes left.

The scoring was even in the middle-period as Mike Cummins found the range at 6:41. Bill Dwyer added to his three point night with one of the assists, and Ron Lane was credited with the other. James pushed in the Dundas goal from Newton and Evans at 8:57, and the frame ended 3-2.

Things looked good for Dundas at 31 seconds of the middle period, when Aussem led Burnett for the goal that put them back on even terms. Five minutes later they were looking up at a 3 goal barrier that they never came close to scaling.

Georgetown drew the lion's share of the penalty bench time. They picked up 10 sentences to 7 for Dundas.

This was the first time these two teams have met in OHA Junior C Central League play this season.
