## Merchant Defensive Wall Foils Raiders Third Time

The Georgetown Raiders are a second place team today the direct result of bumping into Milton Merchants in Memorial Arena, Sunday afternoon.

Though outplayed by their hosts, the Milton presented the better defense and came on in the final period to dump Raiders 8-5 in front of a crowd of 700.

The Milton win left them tied for the first place in the 12 team OHA Central Junior C League with New Hamburg Hahns who also won on the weekend. The New Hamburg club is the hottest team in the league with 11 straight wins.

The loss was Raiders second in a row, having dropped a game with Paris last week, and it was the second time they have howled in Milton in three meetings. Their first encounter ended in a 2-all tie.

Leon Stickle scored two goals for the MILTONS while Craig Brush, Joe Hore, Bruce McDuffe, Roger Wildfong, Sven Gervais and Dick Marshall notched one apiece.

Bob Allen counted two goals to pace Georgetown snipers while singles were rung up by Rod Presswood, Terry Lane, and Simon Llewellyn.

Merchants grabbed a 3-2 first period lead, but sagged in the middle period as Georgetown overpowered them and captured the lead. But Milton still managed to enter the third period on even terms deadlocked 5-5.

They blanked Raiders while scoring three times to salt it away.

Goals by Brush and Stickle opened an early 2-0 Milton lead which was reduced by Rod Presswood's goal half way through the first period. But Stickle's second goal, registered a minute later as Milton went ahead 3-1, and then had their cushion lopped to 3-2 on Terry Lane's goal late in the period.

Joe Hore's tally at the start of the second frame put Merchants ahead 4-2, but Georgetown struck for three goals in less than two minutes to take a 5-4 lead.

Si Llewellyn cut the gap to 4-3, and then two quick goals by Bob Allen, the second on a power play gave Raiders their lead.

Bruce McDuffe's goal in the final minute of the second period created the 5-5 tie.

The big goal for Milton was scored by Roger Wildfong with Raiders missing. He stole the puck from Doug Selby during a Raider power play and raced to score the tie breaking goal. That one took a lot of the starch out of the Georgetown offensive.

Gervais and Dick Marshall then netted goals to put it out of reach.

Frank Marchiori turned aside 28 Georgetown shots but another 15 could have been on target had Raider accuracy not been so erratic Georgetown's

Tom Ayres was credited with 28 saves.

Georgetown has another tough game coming up against the hot New Hamburg Hahns Friday in New Hamburg. They host Hespeler Sunday and play there Wednesday of next week.

## Northern Electric will Almost Double In Size

Five hundred new jobs will be created at the Northern Electric Co. plant in Bramalea when 150,000 additional square feet of manufacturing floor space is completed in late 1966 or early 1967.

The company has announced plans for a \$2 million-plus extension to the present plant on Dixie Road.

J. G. Little, vice president and general manager of the company's switching division, said the additional footage will be added to the existing facilities for production of telephone

switching equipment. The present plant covers 423,000 square feet of manufacturing and 59,000 square feet of office space. Mr. Little expects that ground-breaking will take place in April or May of this year.

The Bramalea plant now has 2,300 employees, and this figure is expected to rise to 3,800 when the new extension is completed, almost doubling the size of the present plant.

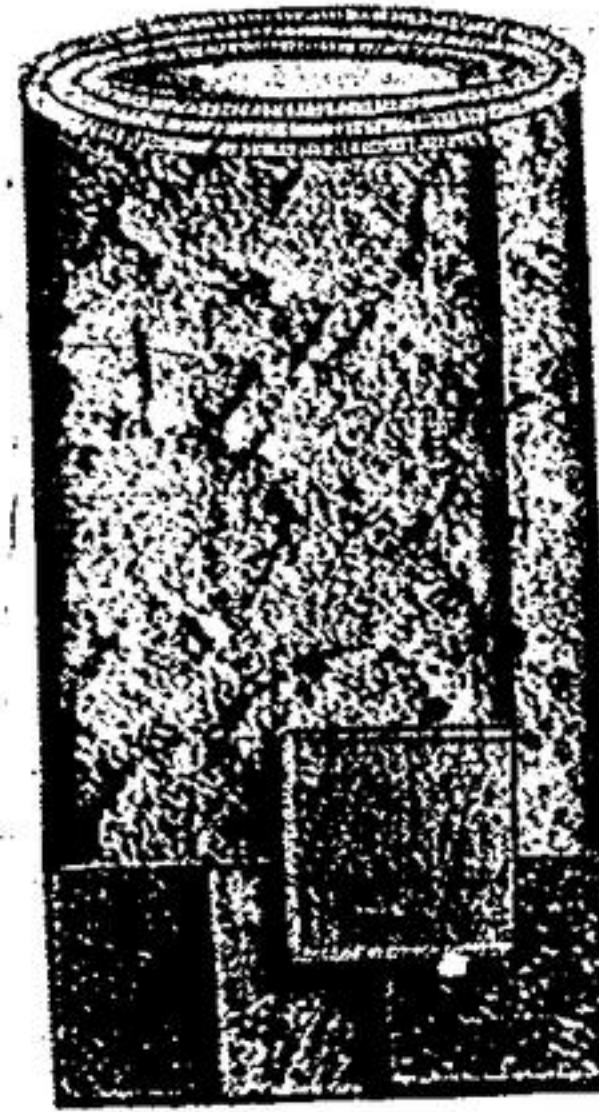
Ground-breaking for the present plant took place in 1962 and personnel moved into the plant in January, 1963.

While the present plant was being built, the company rented space on Clarence Street in Brampton and hired its first employees. By the time the move was made to the new building, the company was already employing 500.

"Our labor force has gone up from there," said William Taylor, works manager with the Bramalea plant.

Northern Electric was the 1st major industry to locate in Brampton. It is one of the largest industries in the area and employs a large number of Georgetown people.
