Best's Insulin Discovery Becomes A "Comic" Strip

A former Georgetown resident Dr. Charles Best, the discoverer of insulin and father of Dr. Sandy Best, Georgetown, former Member of Parliament for Halton, is featured in a "comic" strip currently running in several Canadian daily newspapers.

The strip, entitled The Giants, tells the story of the experiments of Dr. Frederick Banting and Dr. Best at the University of Toronto more than forty years ago, which led to the discovery of the drug by which diabetes can be controlled.

The success of their work brought world fame to the two men. Dr. Banting who was knighted, died in a plane crash in 1941.

In Toronto there are two scientific institutes named in their honour, the Banting Institute and the Best Institute.

Dr. Charles Best purchased Greenock Farm on the south side of the North Halton Golf and Country club many years ago. And his son Dr. Sandy Best and family still reside there.

The Books of Remembrance in the Parliament's Peace Tower in Ottawa list the names of 66,661 Canadians who died on active service in World War I and 44,891 who died in World War II.
