

# Walkie Talkies No Bother Here, Radio Hams Report

Traffic jams on the airwaves as a result of the popularity of transistorized walkie talkies, a problem that has driven some ham radio operators up their antennae, have not been noticeable in Georgetown to local "hams."

"As far as I know, the amateur radio operators in town haven't been bothered by them," Milton Brooker, 7 Ostrander Blvd., told The Herald. Mr. Brooker operates a transmitter-receiver from his home as a hobby.

"They do interfere with the older makes of television sets if they are within a half mile of the set," he said. "If the operator of walkie-talkie was right outside the house it could really be a nuisance, but I don't think there are enough of the walkie talkies around to be a problem."

"Another 'ham' operator, Mrs. Doris Mendham, 10 Roxway Dr., said much the same thing. "I haven't experienced any trouble from them," she said. "The citizens band is relatively new and I seldom use it." The citizens radio band contains the frequency on which the walkie-talkies operate.

A former Georgetown man now living in Brampton, Bob Longmore, had a different view. "A two-way radio is a handy thing to have, but I've had to cut down on its use because some young fellows have been talking a bunch of nonsense," he complained.

"The actual use of the citizens band radio is being watched more closely now by the department of transport," he said.

Mr. Longmore said he had heard swearing, kids playing music, and even people holding the mike to a television set. "We try and use the set once in a while," he said, "but are waiting for regulations to be enforced more strictly, and I think they will be."

Mr. Longmore is activities manager of the Peel Communications Association and uses a two-way radio for business purposes.

This is the first year operators of walkie-talkies have been able to use the airways without a license.

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## Charge Four with Series Of Garage Break-ins

Four men have been charged with theft and breaking and entering seven area service stations North Halton Ontario Provincial Police reported on Thursday.

In the county jail awaiting their court appearances are two Brampton men and two Meadowdale men.

The charges arise out of a break-in spree which took in some 12 area service stations.

Locally, C&V Motors, Ray's R.A., Silvercreek Service Station, and two Norval garages were broken into. Garages elsewhere in the township, Milton and Brampton were also entered.

An OPP officer told The Herald that the number of service stations hit was still not definite and could go much higher.

A car stopped in Brampton for a routine check yielded about \$300 in cash and an undetermined amount of loot.

The arrests were made by North Halton OPP officers Corporal Jack Parkinson and Constable Joe Feldcamp.

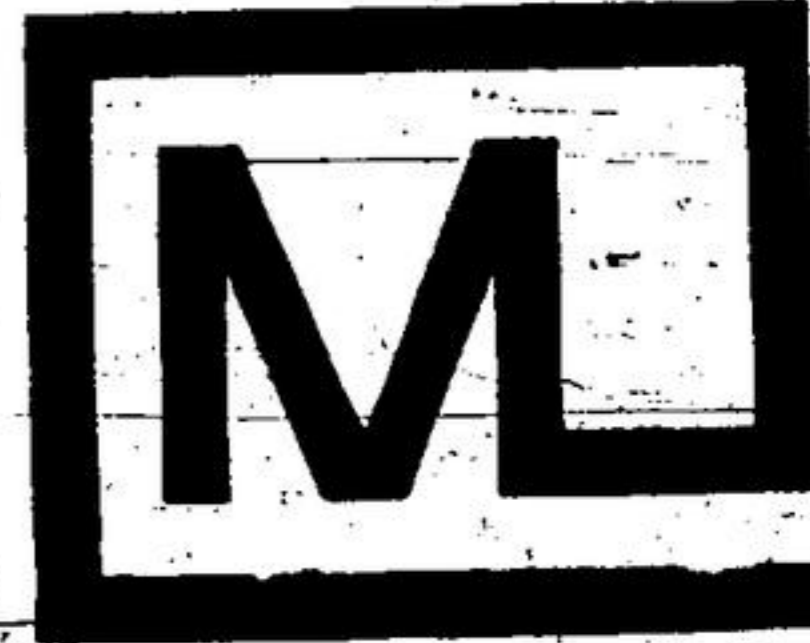
