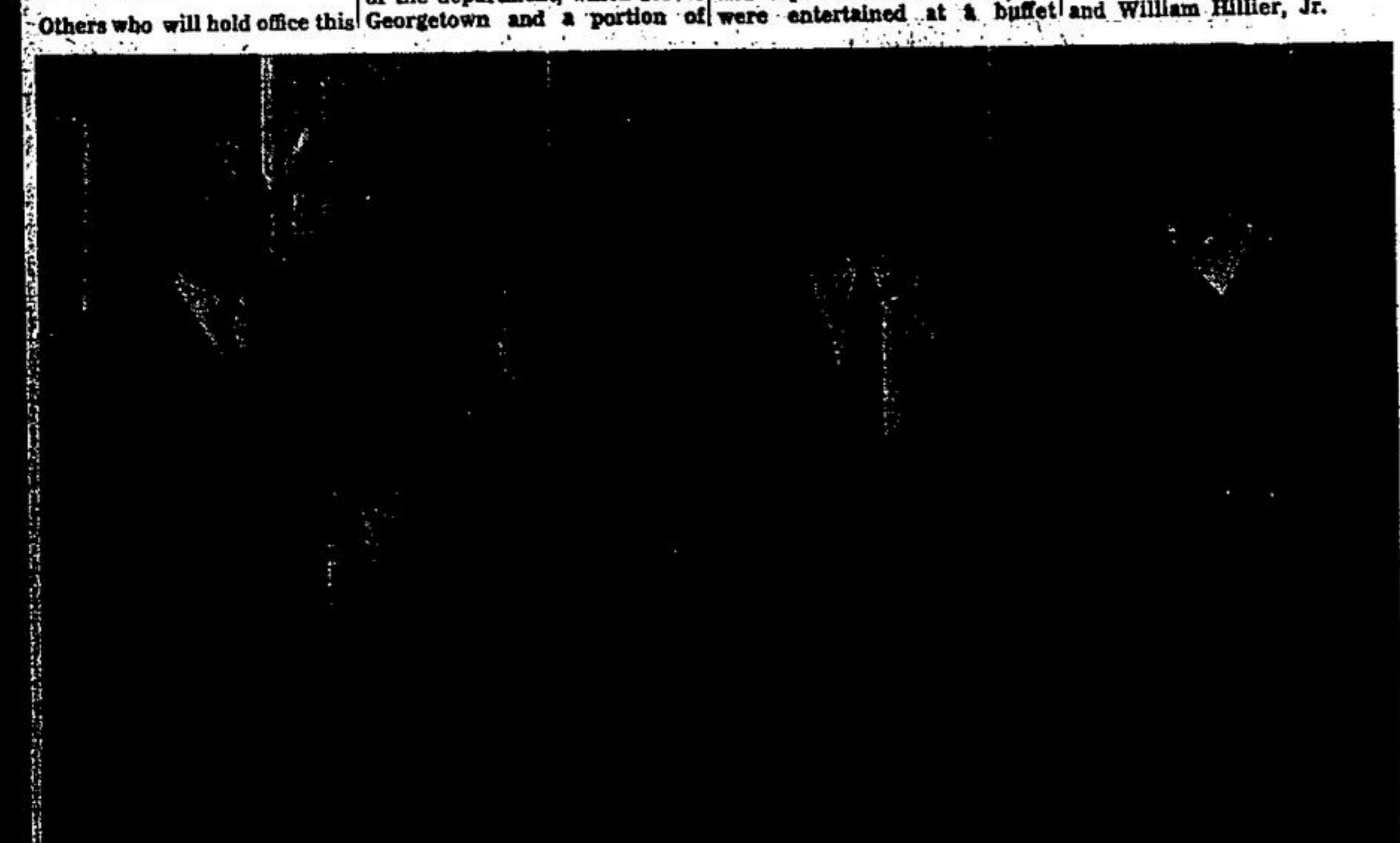

High tribute to the efficiency of the department, which serves Georgetown and a portion of

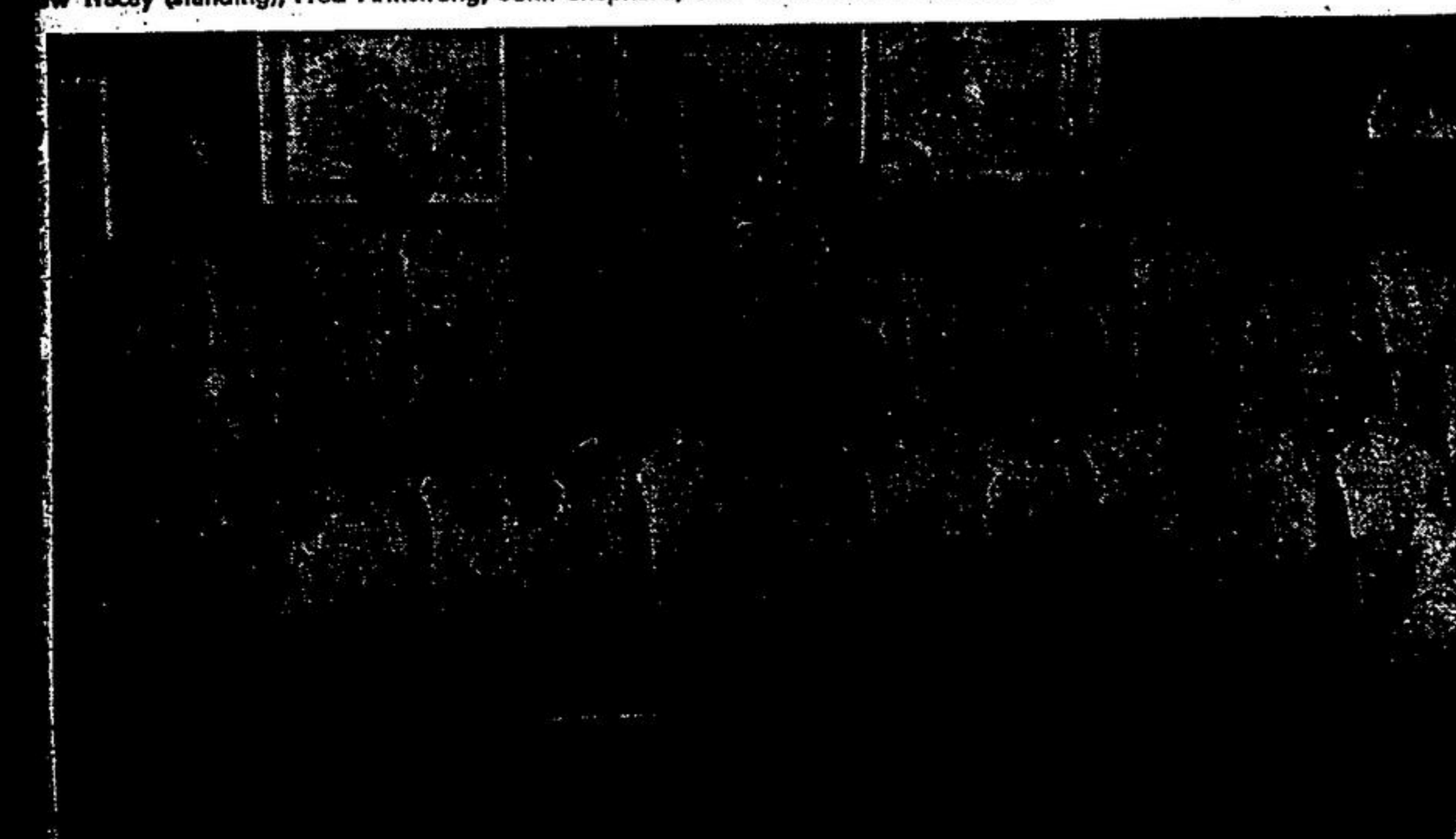

New Math on Television For Georgetown Classrooms

Television was introduced to the classroom in Georgetown schools this week, so that pupils in the senior grades will reap the benefits of the Department of Education programs which commenced Monday morning on CBLT Channel 6.

The broadcasts are based on the Grade 7 course of study in the new Mathematics and a series of eighteen such half hour programs will be seen. Only grades 7 and 8 pupils will see the broadcasts.

The same series commence on station, GHCH Channel 11 at 9:30 on Monday January 17 and it's in the hands of each principal to fit the broadcasts into the classes schedules.

Some will double up the two grades to view the programs at the same time, while others plan to have one grade watch the Ch. 11 presentation at 9:30 and the other Ch. 6 at 10.

At George Kennedy public school on Weber Dr. a gift of the school's home and school association will make it possible for each class to view the broadcasts on their own set.

Other sets have been purchased by the Georgetown public school board.

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LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

What do you do when declarer leads a singleton from dummy and you have the ace of the suit and must play second hand? Do you take your ace or do you duck? One thing you should do is decide before it happens what you will do.

This hand came up at the Acton Bridge Club during the Christmas holiday. One East must have felt like Santa Claus for he gave declarer the contract as a present.

Dealer — South,
Neither side vulnerable.

North
S-Q 9 8 7
H-8
D-Q 10 4 3
C-A K 3 2

West East
S-10 2 S-J 3

The bidding:

South	West	North	East
1S	Pass	2C	Pass
3S	Pass	4S	Pass
5D	Pass	6S	All Pass

South opens with one spade and North responds with two clubs. This bid suits South since clubs were his weak suit. North raises the spades to four. South makes one more slam try with his five diamond bid. North, valuing his singleton heart, makes the final contract a small slam in spades.

West led his singleton club. Since declarer can see the two, three and four of clubs, he knows that the lead was a singleton. Winning the club in dummy, declarer takes out-trump, ending in dummy. The singleton heart was led and East presented do-

clarer with his contract. East played the heart ace. Declarer now had the rest of the tricks. His two high hearts took care of dummy's small clubs. In all declarer took five spades, two hearts, a diamond, two clubs and two club ruffs in dummy.

Notice the effect if East does not play the heart ace. Declarer wins a heart trick but lost two clubs in exchange.

Why should East duck the heart? First, declarer may not have the king and queen. He might have king and jack and make a mistake. Secondly, East also knew that West's lead was a singleton. Therefore, South

Receipts Indicate Increase In Christmas Seal Donations

Returns from the Christmas Seal Campaign of Halton TB association so far have totalled \$33,400, it is reported by Mrs. M. E. Lunan, secretary-treasurer of the Association. This is an improvement on the \$31,500 received at this time last year, when the final total was \$36,600.

Much of the money will be used for conducting the mass tuberculosis survey in Halton, which will cost 10 cents per capita. A "kick-off" dinner for the campaign will be held next week. Chest examinations will be conducted in the schools starting this month, and the survey of industrial employees will begin about the middle of February. The public survey is scheduled to get underway at the end of the month, with a house-to-house canvass.

Heading the campaign as county chairman is Rev. Myles Estabrooks, pastor of Turner Chapel, A.M.E. Church, Oakville.
