

# Future Additions to Make New Public School Largest

Construction has started on Georgetown's 6th public school. Ground was broken last week on the project which will ease the strain on the heavily taxed facilities at two schools, George Kennedy Public School and Harrison Public School. The new building will go in an area directly between Kennedy and Harrison schools.

The school, initially a seven room building, will be located in the space of Sargent Rd. and Mountainview Rd. in the vicinity of St. Paul's Baptist Church.

Architects' drawings include three future additions which will ultimately make it the largest school in the local system. An auditorium is included in the plans.

The Georgetown public school board called tenders in October and awarded the construction contract to McNally Construction. The firm's bid was the lowest of nine received.

It is expected the school will open for the fall term.

## Instruction Available At Georgetown Bridge Club
