**Ending 11 Game Winning Spree**

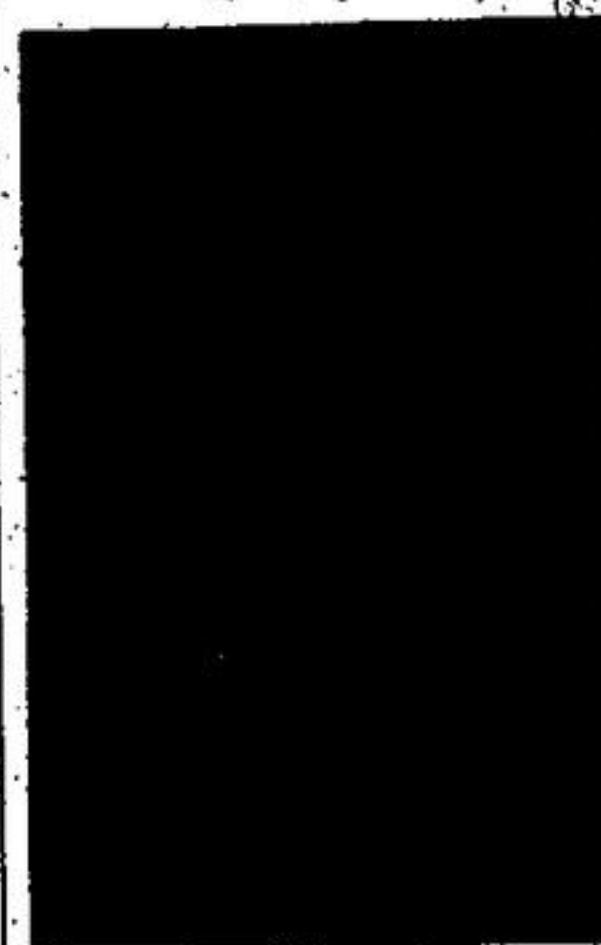

**Georgetown Back Atop Junior**  
**Hockey Heap By a Point**

Georgetown Junior C Raiders climbed back into the O.H.A. Central League lead by roaring from behind to subdue Hespeler Shamrocks 5-2 here Sunday.

Georgetown spotted their visitors a 2-0 advantage before counting a goal well into the second period, but Raiders netminder Tommy Ayres shut the door for the last two periods as his team mates went to work at the other end of the ice.

Raiders scored three times in the middle spasm to overhaul the hopeful Hespelers, and capped things with two goals early in the final period. Hespeler trails the 12 team loop with just three wins in twenty starts.

Raiders now have 15 wins, 4 defeats and a tie for 31 points, one more than New Hamburg and Milton who are tied for second.

The Shamrock had their 2-0 edge before the game was 7 minutes old. Main beat Ayres without assistance at 3:38, and Leach from Main and Eaton doubled the gap at 6:20.

Georgetown's leading scorer, Ron Lane sniped his 12 and 13th goals, unassisted at 6:02 and from Wayne Riddall at 18:37 to erase the difference. A minute later Mike Cummins notched the winner, his 13th, from R. Lane and Riddall.

Raiders pulled into a 4-2 lead with a little over 3 minutes gone in the third period as Bill Dwyer hit for his 20th goal from Rod Presswood and Paul Robinson. Robinson uncorked Georgetown's 5th, his 17th, from Terry Lane and Ron Presswood.

The paying customers had little chance to see the clubs on even terms as penalties played a big part in ebb and flow

of strength. The referee handed out 24 sentences, 13 to Hespeler.

Two Georgetown players drew fighting majors for second period extra curricular activities. Terry Lane and Wayne Riddall served the 5 minute terms, but three Hespeler charges got the same sentences, Brent, Eaton and Hamilton. Brent and Eaton's times were stretched to 7 minutes by the addition of high sticking minors.

Coach Herb Kewley apparently let his charges know what he thought of the foolish penalties they took in the last game since minor sentences were much rarer in this one.
