COUNCIL BRIEFS

Monday night Council dealt with a number of by-laws. They passed by-law authorizing the construction of watermain and the elevated storage tank on Mountainview Road at a cost of \$240,000, a by-law to authorize the borrowing of \$718,000 for the interim financing of the high school addition, (Georgetown's share is \$260,000 to be debentured), and a by-law to allow the stopping up of Todd Road.

Council authorized the erection of "No Parking" signs on the east side of John St. for a distance of three hundred feet, from the Guelph Street corner.

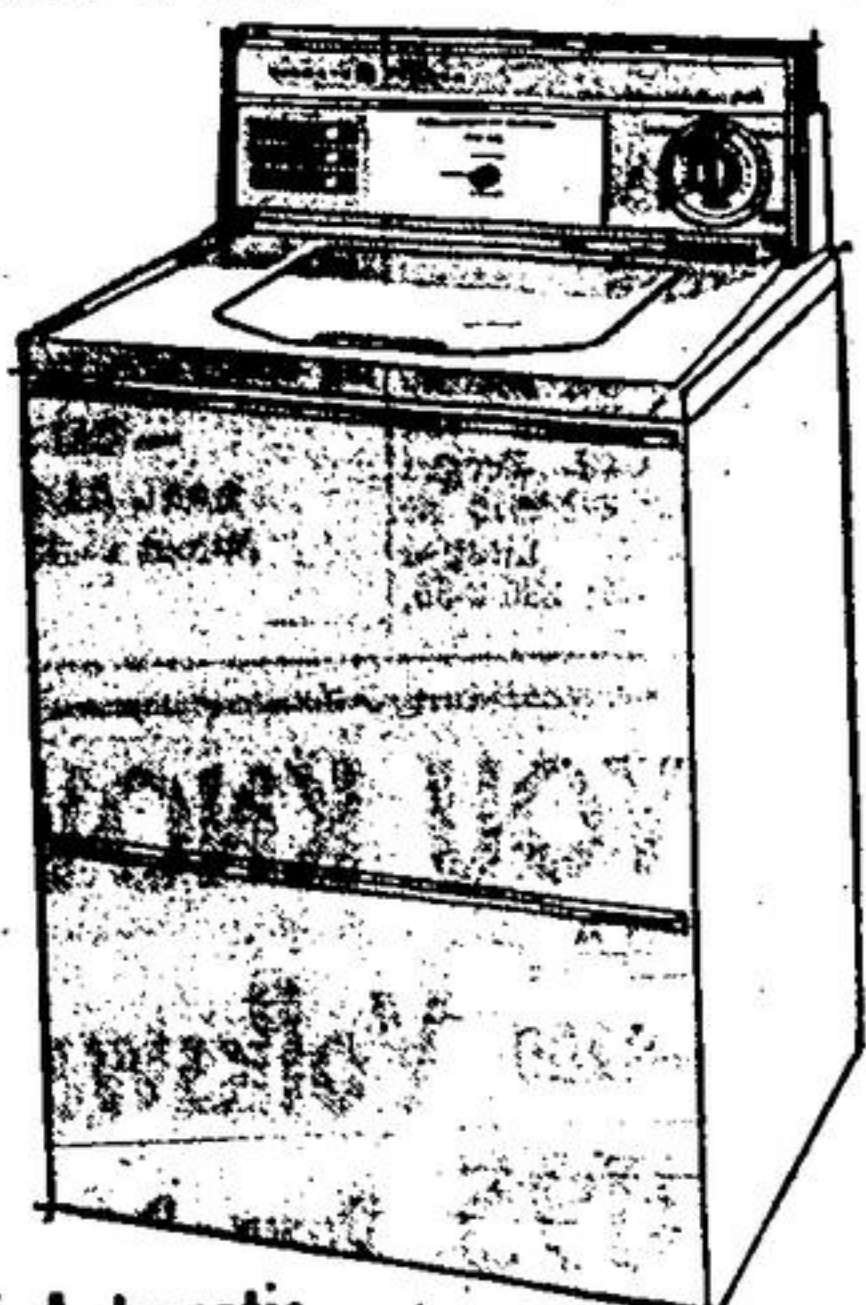

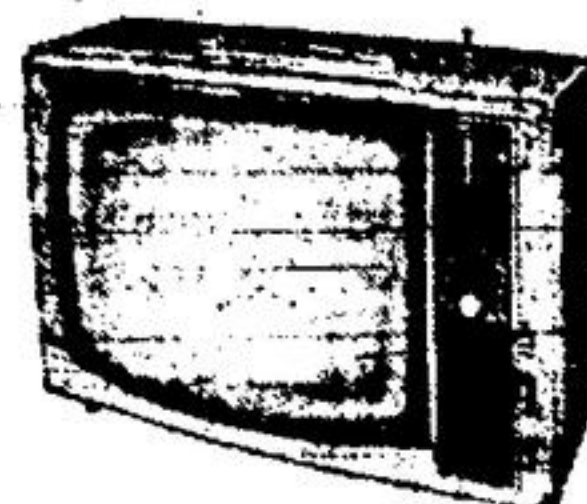
