

Library Books Last Year Georgetown Read 80,000

For the fifth year in succession, the Georgetown Library circulation figures show a healthy increase — another 12,000 books per year, to bring the total circulation to 88,000. In spite of this increase the number of books borrowed per member is still below the provincial average, so that a similar increase may be expected for some time to come.

The Library staff has been increased in the past year to cope with the increase in business. Mrs. Peggy Treahy was appointed as Assistant Librarian in May, in place of Mrs. Balkin who resigned at that time. Mrs. C. Burt was engaged as a part-time assistant at the same time. A further full-time assistant, Miss D. Graham was appointed in December.

Mr. Dave Bowman, Treasurer of the Board since 1961 resigned this office in May owing to pressure of other business, and his place was taken by Mrs. A. Suberland. Mr. Bowman has continued to act as Property Chairman and to bring near completion the program of Library building renovation. The major building project in 1968 has been the installation of the

Kalwall window insulation, which should ensure greater comfort for library patrons, as well as lower heating costs.

In 1968 regular library classes for public school grades were instituted, and another innovation was the purchase of a tape recorder, so that reminiscences of Georgetown may be recorded, particularly by some of the long time residents.

The Library has received a number of gifts of books, which have been put into circulation this year. Most notable were the collections of the late Mr. F. C. Hastings, received at the end of 1964, and of the late Miss I. Preston, at the end of 1965. In addition, over 2,000 new books have been purchased, at a cost of over \$5000.

Last year 34 Halton patients were assisted by the March of Dimes. This included treatment at the Toronto Orthopaedic Clinic, special x-rays, surgery, special shoes, even financing the cost of a housekeeper while a housewife was hospitalized.
