

STARS TWINKLE IN MEMORIAL ARENA WEDNESDAY

The OHA Junior C Central League's southern all-star team will take a slight edge in tonight's game in Georgetown Memorial Arena Wednesday night, Jan. 20th.

Two southern teams, Georgetown Raiders and Milton Merchants sit at the surface of the 12 team circuit, and another southern club Simcoe, which topped the title last year is in fourth place.

These three teams contribute 15 players to the 20 player

lineup which was released last week. Raiders with 6, and Merchants with 5 dominate the dream team, while Simcoe has the next heaviest representation, four. The balance are from Paris, Brantford, and Dundas.

Georgetown all-stars selected by their team mates, are defencemen Rod Presswood and Wayne Riddall, centre Bill Dwyer, right winger Mike Cummins, and left wingers Paul Robinson and Doug Selby.

New Hamburg Hahns dominate the northern team. The lineup, released on the week-end, includes six players from the Hahns and four each from the Orangeville, Hanover and Elmira clubs.

One player each from Hesperia and Preston Pals will round out the team.

Goaltender John Brenner, defencemen Doug Cressman and Don Culbert, centre Ron Mark, rightwinger Ken East and leftwinger Chuck Harmer are the players who were selected from the third place Hahns.

On hand from the Orangeville Hornets will be goalie Jim Peters, defenceman Jack Davidson, centre, Wayne Wattle and leftwinger Dennis Kowalchuk.

Defencemen Bob Veitch and Ken Seiling, centre Howie McDonald and rightwinger Lavorne Miller will be on hand from Elmira, while defencemen Verne Batte, center Jerry Herman and wingers Jim Bell and Allan Lennox were selected from Hanover.

Leftwinger Ross Russell of Preston and rightwinger Merv Main of Hesperia Shamrocks round out the club.

The Northern all stars will be coached by Jerry Forler of New Hamburg while the Southern team, will be handled by Gerry Inglis of Georgetown.

Shamrock Rally Backfires Raiders 2-Goal Victors

Twelfth place Hesperia Shamrocks put up a struggle before being tagged Georgetown Raiders' 18th victim of the 1965-66 OHA Junior C Central League season in Hesperia Thursday night.

Raiders and Hesperia are at the opposite ends of the stack. The teams were deadlocked 3-3 all after two periods, but Georgetown gained the upper hand in the third frame to tuck away a 6-4 victory.

Like their meeting on the previous weekend which Georgetown won 5-2, this was a rough one featuring third period fistuffs. Two Hesperia players, Eaton and Devries drew 5 minute majors. Georgetown's Cummins was assessed a fighting major and Rod Presswood a ten minute misconduct penalty.

Ron Lane and Paul Robinson each scored twice and Wayne Riddall and Bill Dwyer once for the redshirts. Fox and Darcy each counted a pair for Hesperia.

Georgetown owned a 3-2 lead at the end of the first period. The team's points leader Ron Lane struck at 4:35 from Doug Selby and Don Norton, Paul Robinson scored at 12:12, and Riddall from Mike

Cummins accounted for the third Raider score at 13:57.

Hesperia's goal was netted by Fox from Hamilton at 8:59 and Darcy all alone at 14:29. They created the 3-all tie after just 3 minutes of the middle period when Fox lashed Devries past behind Tommy Ayres in the Raider cage.

Ron Lane snapped the tie with the third period just 37 seconds old. Robinson assisting, and Georgetown never relinquished the lead. They took a 3-3 lead when Robinson punched in his second goal from Selby and Norton at 7:32, but that shrunk to 5-4 with less than a minute and half left when Darcy steered McDonald's relay into an open corner, and set the stage for Hesperia's last ditch effort to tie.

Their six-attacker strategy backfired when Bill Dwyer hit an unguarded net with 10 seconds to go. Selby and Riddall were credited with the assists.

The game started on the mild side and worked up to the fights. There were just 3 penalties called in the first period, 5 in the second and 7 in the third. Georgetown players were nicked for 9 of them.
