**Round Robin Playoffs Begin Saturday Morning**

This Saturday the five week round robin play-off series will begin. This series will determine what teams will go on into the semi-finals and finals of Saturday morning Hockey. On completion of the five week series (4 games to count) the five low teams will be eliminated, the remaining four teams will go on to the semi-finals, which will consist of two games, total goals to count.  
The final series will be the same, 2 games, total goals. Team standings for the round-robin series will be decided as follows, if ties should occur, 1. Most points, if ties, Most wins, if ties, Goals For, if still ties, Goals against.  
At the end of each game we ask that coaches and managers assist in getting their teams off the ice as soon as possible so the next game may begin with as little loss of time as possible, also note that the play-offs have begun Junior 'A' coaches are not allowed on the ice during their game.  
If both coach and manager are unable to be on hand for their game in any league please contact your commissioner so that arrangements can be made to have someone look after your team, other than the father of one of the boys on the team concerned as per Rule No. 3 Saturday morning hockey. (ie) "A" father shall not be allowed to coach his son's team or allowed on the players' bench during his game's."

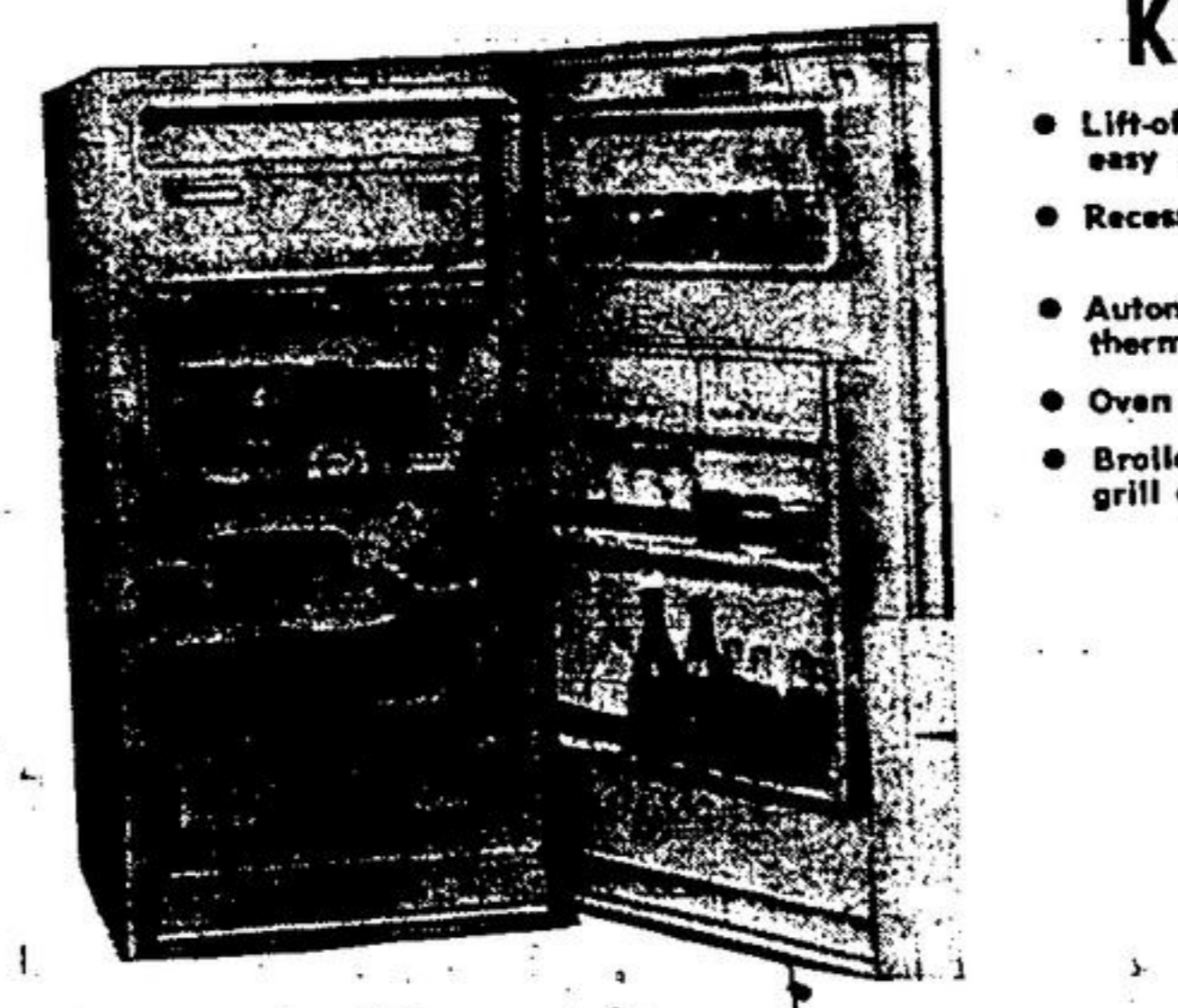
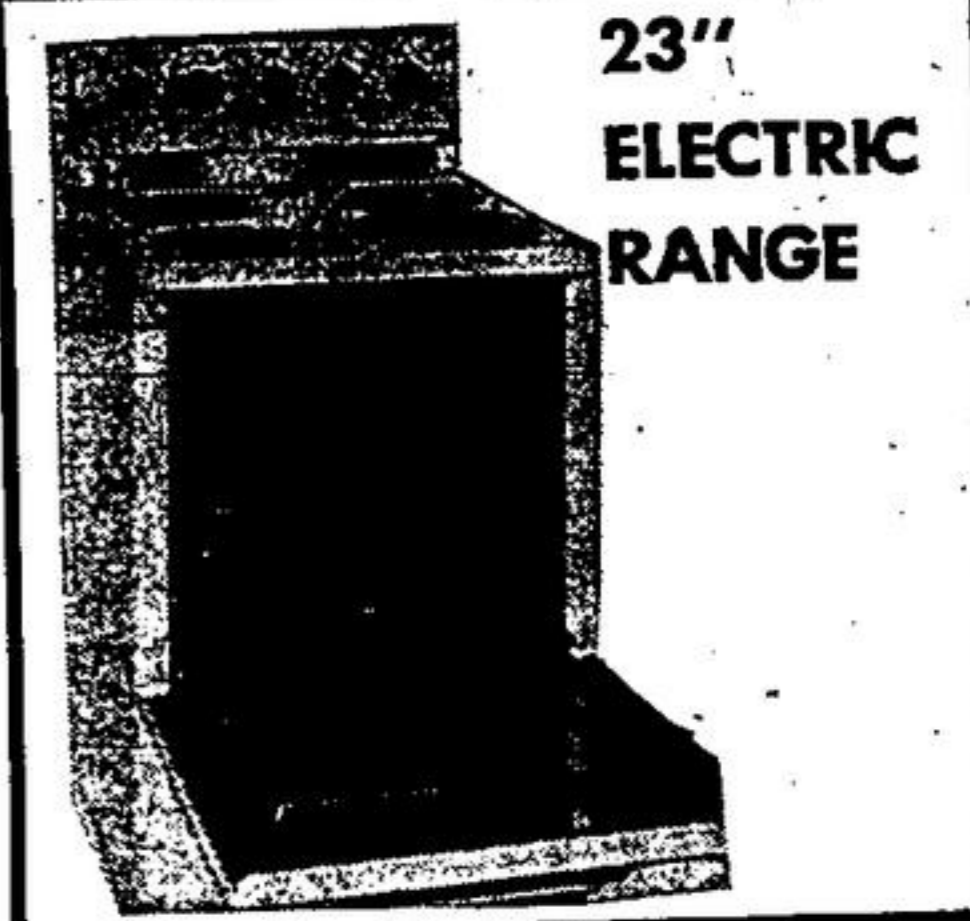

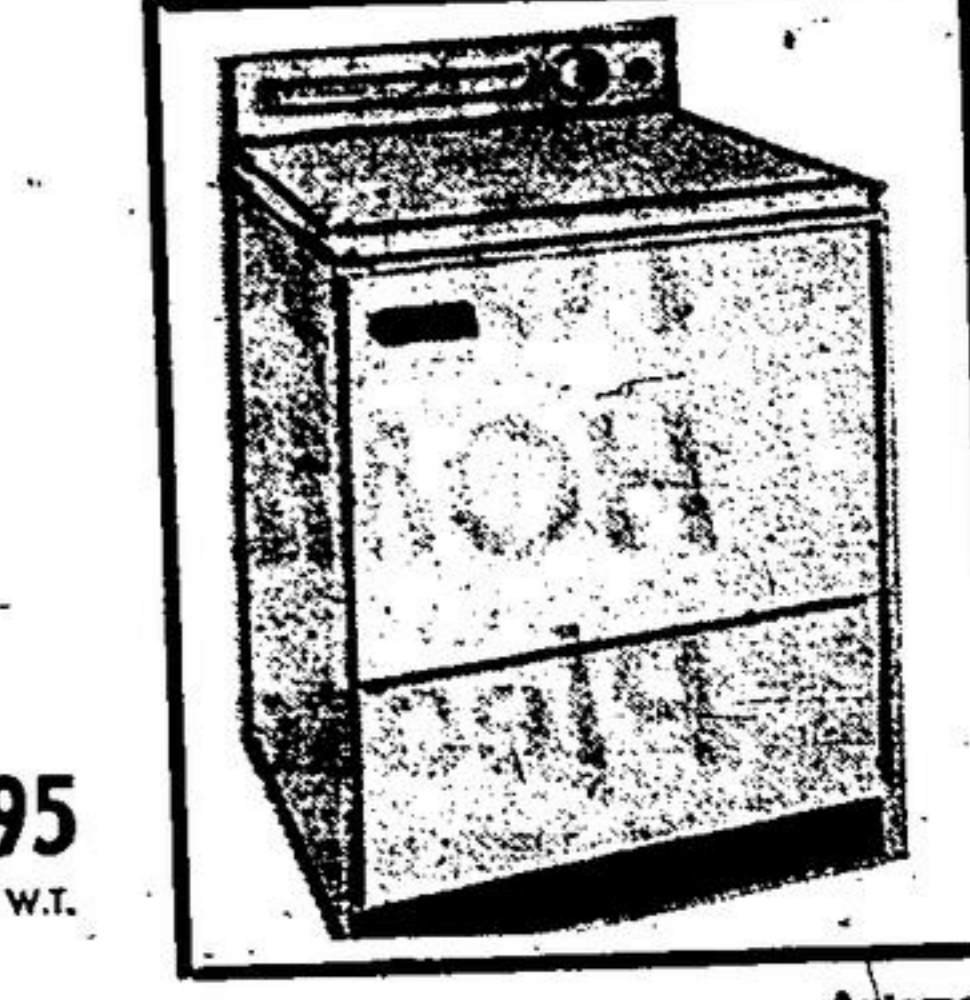
