

Anglicans Continue \$1000 Support to World Missions

A \$4,500 increase in 1966 commitments was voted by the members of St. George's Anglican Church at the annual vestry meeting which followed an evening service in the church on Sunday evening.

Reporting to the congregation, Irwin Noble, people's warden, pointed out that while contributions of \$17,000 had tallied about the same as the year before, a general increase in expenses necessitated a bank loan of \$1500 to balance the books at the year-end.

The new budget, while allowing for a number of expense increases, must also provide repayment of this, he pointed out.

A diocesan apportionment of \$4,000 and a contribution of \$1,000 to the Anglican World Mission will be continued this year.

Mr. Noble was appointed as rector's warden to succeed Charles Harris, who has held the post for four years. The vestry voted Walter Biehn as the new people's warden.

In his speech to the congregation, Rev. John McMulkin, said anticipated growth of the town meant the church must be prepared to welcome new Anglicans, and to have general plans for handling a larger congregation.

He said two areas where improvements can be made are in Christian education and stewardship. Working towards this, a committee headed by Larry Maughan is planning increased work among young teens, as well as adult study classes, while Ted Gorth heads a stewardship committee.

Church insurance had been reviewed last year and Murray Henley reported a total of \$140,000 now in force on church buildings, with replacement value now received rather than depreciated value.

Honouring a parishioner who has completed fifty years as a member of the Woman's Association, the last 25 years of this as president, Mrs. Sam Walker

was presented with a set of luggage by Mrs. M. Maynard, while a motion from the vestry pointed to her as a sterling example of Christian womanhood.

"Every minute of my years in the W.A. has been a pleasure," answered Mrs. Walker. "I appreciate this gift but it is not needed. Working for the church is satisfaction enough, and I have had wonderful co-operation from the members all through the years."

The meeting voted a message of sympathy to the congregation of St. Matthew's, Hamilton, whose downtown church was destroyed by fire recently.

Grant Johnston was elected chairman of sidesmen. Jack Armstrong, Charles Harris and Ted Gorth were elected lay delegates to synod, with Paul Armstrong and Murray Henley as alternates.

Mrs. Jim Costigan will continue as envelope secretary and Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Thompson as auditors.

Paul Armstrong acted as vestry clerk.

Activities of the various church organizations were detailed in a booklet given to those attending the meeting.

Church school showed a total of 188 pupils with an average attendance of 127, and special offerings included a contribution to the World Mission for Lenten boxes, and a special Halloween collection for UNICEF.

The Women's Auxiliary spent a total of \$885, mainly on various missions, while also assisting St. Alban's parish, Glen Williams, with a contribution towards flood damage and sponsoring a child at summer camp.

Daughters of the Church, whose \$1,100 receipts come mainly from sponsorship of monthly luncheons remodelled the kitchen as a major project.

The Brotherhood of Anglican Churchmen also assisted St. Alban's, and sent a boy to camp. The junior auxiliary report showed an active year of religious education, fellowship and interesting projects. A cup of tea was served by the W. A. following the meeting.

The youth also was given an additional six months hard labour in the county jail and prohibited from driving in Canada for three years.

"The court takes a dim view of acts of violence involving elderly ladies," Magistrate Langdon said. "It would be a miscarriage of justice to suspend sentence."
