CURLING CHATTER

The third week of the second schedule is now in the books. Standings are posted in the bulletin board and are up for the three games played in this draw. Check the list to see where your team stands and start figuring now on how you are going to make the playoffs. The draws end the week of February 12. So there are not too many games left to play.

This year, the Erin club was host for the legion district bonspiel. But owing to other commitments their ice was not available and the play was switched to the North Halton ice. The bonspiel was held last Saturday. As this is written on Sunday, and being snowbound, the results of the spiel will have to appear next week. The sports director of the Legion left the list of winners at the club for publication and they will appear at a later date.

A number of rule books are in the lounge at the club. It would be a good idea for curlers who are waiting for a game, to pick these little books up and read them. Both new and old curlers. It will refresh your memory of the basic rules of the game and make play much more enjoyable. To the newer members, it will give an insight into the basic rules of the game and help you to avoid breaking the basic rules.

A number of members have asked for the measurements of a curling sheet. Here they are: It is 12 feet from the hack to the tee. From there it is 21 feet to the hog line. The hog lines are 72 feet apart and from there it is 21 feet in to the tee. The tee is also the sweeping line or where you can start sweeping the rock towards the other tee. Opposing skips have equal rights to sweeping the stone after it passes the tee line.

Here is another tip on curling etiquette: When a skip is holding his broom for one of his rink, no other broom should be on the ice, near or behind him.

Another one reads: Don't congregate behind the house when one of the opposing rink is shooting.

A team of curlers from the Ladies Section of the North Halton Curling Club won second prize in a two game bonspiel at the Orangeville Club last Friday. They played in the second draw.
