## Georgetown Man Gets Top Post in Halton Baseball

Bill Richmond of Georgetown chairman of the Halton County 'Minors' for the past three seasons was elected president of the Halton County Baseball Association on Saturday afternoon in Waterdown.

The portly but energetic Georgetown man won out in a two-way battle for the president's chair with incumbent Earl Nicholson. Mr. Nicholson, president of the association for the past two years, defeated Mr. Richmond in a two way fight for the presidency in 1965.

Nearly 40 baseball men, representing most of the towns who compete in Halton County play, attended the annual meeting of the association. Halton County life member Bill Randall, Milton Minor Baseball Association president Bill McTrach, Milton Red Sox manager Dick Clement and Murray Hood, a member of the MMBA and the HCBA, were the only Milton men at the meeting. Mr. Hood was elected to the Halton executive as third vice president.

Larry Russell, a catcher and utility performer with the Hamilton Red Wings last year, represented his team at the meeting and reported the 1965 version of the Red Wings would be competing in the Inter-County League in 1966. However he indicated that Hamilton still wanted to be represented in the Halton league and it was expected a second team would be formed for that purpose.

The Association's executive for the coming year is as follows: president Bill Richmond; immediate past president Earl Nicholson; first vice president Al Burrows of Oakville; second vice president Len Andrews of Campbellville; and third vice president Murray Hood of Milton.

Reg Locke of Burlington was re-appointed as secretary-treasurer of the Association and gave the treasurer's report for the year. For the first time since 1961 the Association operated at a profit rather than a deficit. Currently the Association has a bank account of \$888.87 of which \$400 is the default fee for intermediate teams. The All-Star fund, the source of funds for paying the minor league umpires, currently stands at \$669.65.

Mr. Locke indicated the Association had increased dramatically in size since 1962. He pointed out in 1962, 32 teams competed under the Halton County banner, and in 1965, 49 teams competed. In his report he stated "there were only two teams (29 players) that filled out their certificates completely and accurately. The rest had to be completed in some form. We had 42 players in our Association who did not play OBA ball due to the fact that proof of age was not received before the deadline."

Hottest topic of the afternoon was brought up by Georgetown Giant manager Clayton "Dude" Lindsay. The Giant mentor recalled his team had travelled to Preston late in the season for an important game and when they arrived the umpires refused to start the game. The crux of the problem was the lights in Preston. The umpires claimed it wasn't safe to play after dark on the poorly lit diamond. According to Mr. Lindsay, no decision was handed down by the executive and he claimed his team should have at least received travelling expenses. It was decided after a lengthy discussion, to deal with the matter at the first meeting of the new executive.

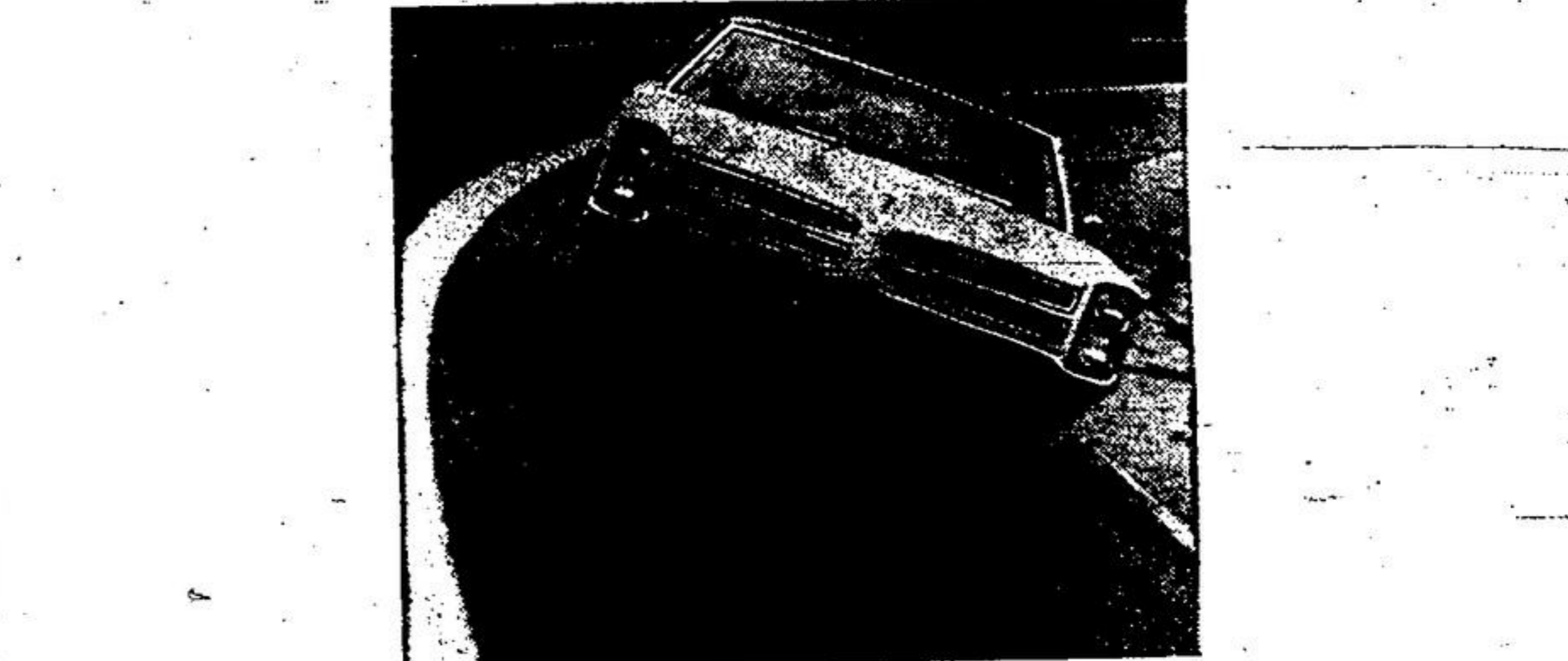
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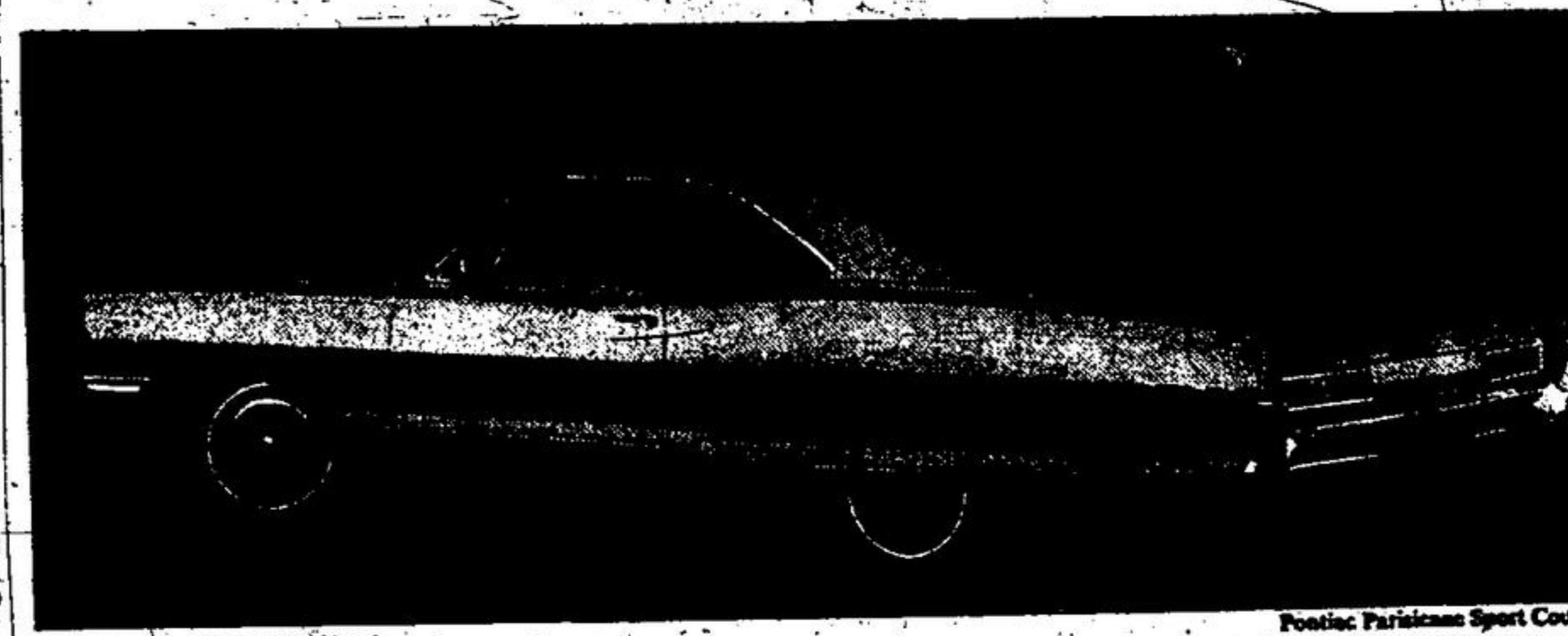
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
