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Discuss Red China at Waterloo Symposium

Six teachers from Georgetown District High School attended a symposium on Red China held at Waterloo University on Friday, January 28th. Teachers attending were: D. Thomson, F. Corning, G. Bechtel, Mrs. M. Tucker, Miss M. Rossel and T. Ramnatarajah. In the afternoon, a CBC documentary film on Red China called 'Land of the 700 Million' was shown in the Fine Arts Theatre. Roy Fabbish of CBO-TV who participated in the filming introduced the picture, and answered questions afterward on the difficulties they encountered in making the film. Two papers on China were also presented.

Charles Taylor, also a former Correspondent for the Globe & Mail in Peking, presented his views of life in China as he saw it. He viewed the major problem as one of communication as visitors tend to be only shown the best, and that the language barrier makes any spontaneous interchange with the Chinese almost impossible.

After a reception and dinner in the University of Waterloo's new University Village, the evening was taken over by Clare McDermott, a Reuters News Agency Correspondent, who gave an illustrated lecture on China including geography, China's economic problems and daily life.

The Symposium was held under the auspices of the Canadian Association of Geographers, and was chaired by Professor Officer of Waterloo University's Geography Department.

He commented that China has such severe domestic difficulties, especially over food production, that they were not interested in actual political domination in Asia, but rather wanted to concentrate on building up their backward economy; He substantiated this view by pointing out that China was careful not to contribute too much to the North Vietnamese war effort, and that "China's bayk was worse than her bite."

Mr. Nossal suggested that China as a nuclear power has every right to be present in decision-making bodies, and that Canada should attempt to open more lines of communication with her in the form of business and cultural exchanges.

Consultant to Report on Town's Best Building Plan

With three possibilities under consideration to provide better accommodation for municipal departments, council on Monday engaged Canadian Mitchell Associates of Brampton to prepare a report. Cost is not to exceed \$500.

The report will advise on feasibility of an addition to the present municipal building on Main St., a complete new building on James Street near the ambulance building; and a new building beside the Maple Ave. waterworks station which would house police and works department quarters.

While a council majority favoured the report, two were in opposition.

Reeve Hunter said the town already has a planning consultant, Mr. Little who could give the same advice.

Cr. Emmerson argued that the report would not tell council anything it doesn't know already.

"They will tell us what is the logical thing on which to spend money" countered Cr. Hyde. "And I can't help saying that we should consider the old post office too."

Cr. Hyde sponsored purchase of that building two years ago, but next year's council reversed this and the post office has since been sold.

Harrison Claims Credit For Industrial Road

Cr. Fred Harrison told council Monday that he would take the credit for creation of an access road to a portion of the town-owned industrial land in east Georgetown.

"It was my production of a map, showing that same of this would be landlocked, that directly led to the new road," he said.

Earlier in the meeting, council voted to name the new street Martin Road in honour of one of the town's senior citizen.
