

Smoke Was on Egg Throwers As Raiders Humble Milton

Georgetown Junior C Raiders lived an egg throwing spree as Milton hockey fans and a lot of temper tantrums by rabid players to carry a triumph to safety Friday night.

The win firmly entrenched the Raiders in first place in the five team loop, a position Milton Merchants had counted on occupying after Friday.

Both the egg throwing and displays of temper came in final period when Georgetown buried the Merchants with a goal eruption after Milton captured a 2-1 lead.

In the final period Milton took 11 penalties including three misconducts, a major and a 5 minute match penalty which means some time on the carpet.

The chippy Milton charged and up 20 penalties to 13 for the Raiders. A crowd of about 1,000 watched the game.

The Raiders carried a 1-0 advantage of the first frame on strength of Bob Allen's goal from Doug Selby at 1:28.

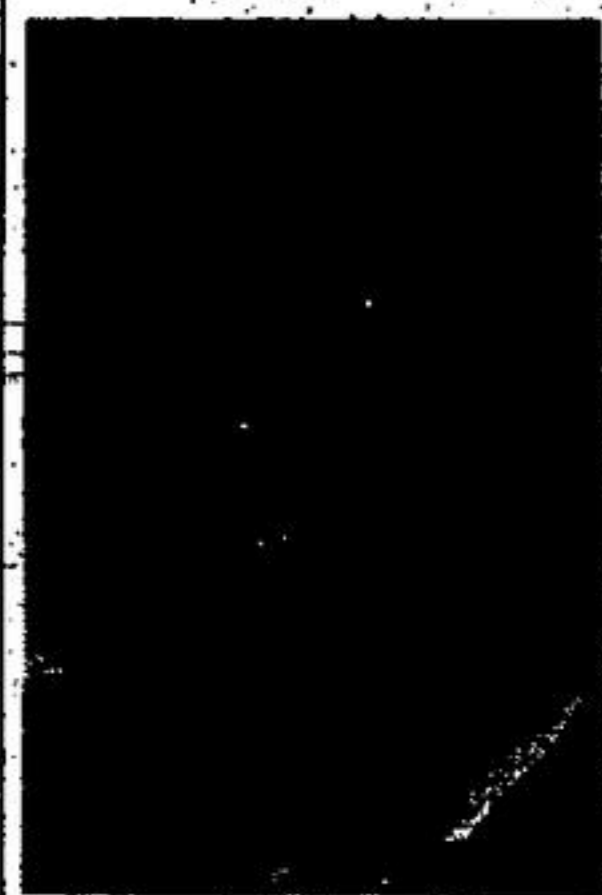

Raiders started to steam roll their rivals at 1:07. High points man Ron scored from Bill Dwyer and Paul Robinson to erase the lead.

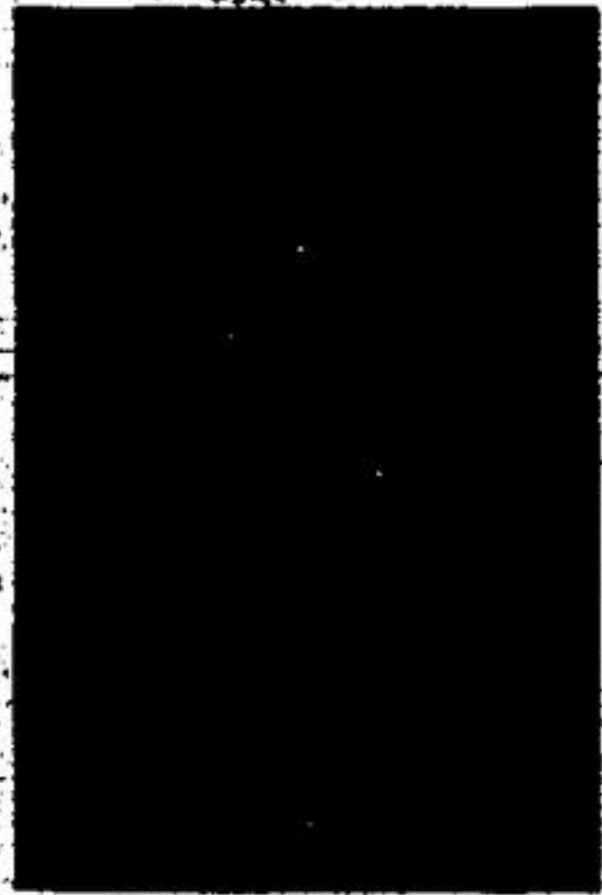

Baseball Budget Needs \$1300 Assist from Town

Summer seemed a little closer, Monday night when Bill Richmond, president of the Georgetown Baseball Association, appeared before Council to outline their budget for the year, and ask for financial support.

Mr. Richmond thanked council for their support in previous years, and stated it would have been impossible to carry on without it. The budget figures showed a total estimated expenditure of \$2,568. The Association hopes to raise \$1,262 themselves, leaving a deficit of \$1,306.

Some 300 boys would participate in baseball, Mr. Richmond predicted, with 200 of them being in the Minor House league ball. He noted that the year's \$1,000 grant from the one mill recreational levy had been insufficient, and had necessitated the dropping of the Tykes, Pee Wees and Bantams from the Halton County competition.

He reminded council of the part baseball plays in channeling the boys' energies. "While two of our boys have been scouted by the big leagues," he added, "this is not our primary purpose. We are interested in building character," he concluded.

Cr. W. Smith remarked that council was well aware of the job done by the Association over the years, and commended the way the budget was prepared. He said the matter would be dealt with at Thursday's committee meeting.

Cr. Fred Harrison asked if any of the boys were from outside of Georgetown, and was told about three, perhaps. Cr. Harrison contended that surrounding areas like Esquesing should pay a share of recreational activities such as the Arena, the Library, and the Baseball Association.

"If the odd one comes in from out of town," replied Bill Richmond, "we can't very well throw them out on their ear."
