Police Chief's Protest Brings Mayor's Criticism

Sharp criticism of the administration of the police department was Mayor Joe Gibbons' reaction to a letter from Police Chief Roy Haley, Monday night at council.

In the letter, the Chief thanked council for the recent raise, on behalf of himself and the deputy chief, but he contended that the raise was inadequate. He claimed that should any reasonable raise be given to members of the Police Association, when their brief is presented, a sergeant would earn almost as much as the chief or the deputy. He concluded by asking council to reconsider the increase.

"I anticipated this would happen," stated Deputy Reeve J. Young. "After all we gave a girl fresh out of school a raise of \$150, and offered the Chief \$100 a year, that is," added the deputy reeve. "If the Police Association get an increase," continued the deputy reeve, "the deputy chief would earn somewhat less than a sergeant."

"I don't like the tone of the letter," began the mayor. "In fact I'm not satisfied with the administration of the police department." He went on to complain of the leadership in that department, and claimed it should be reorganized.

"A week ago we received a letter from that person intimating that if there was no increase we could consider the letter his resignation," the mayor continued, "perhaps we should have accepted it."

Deputy Reeve Young admitted he might not be completely satisfied, but said "the things were ironing themselves out. I think there's a bit of personal conflict between you two."

The mayor denied there was anything personal in his objections, and promised he would go along with a raise if he was convinced the town was getting the protection it deserves.

Cr. E. Hyde opined that the matter had been discussed at length in Committee, and that was the place for any further discussion on the subject.
