## Defends CVCA, Says Town Water Supply is Enhanced

When Cr. Bill Smith asked council Monday when the town would reap some benefits from its yearly \$10,000 grant to Credit Valley Conservation Authority, the CVCA drew a spirited defence by Cr. Ern Hyde.

"We're reaping it right now," he said. "If it weren't for them, we would be discussing where to get our water instead of having a plentiful supply. We are one of the fortunate towns which have a good supply in the ground and conservation will keep it there."

Mr. Hyde said that when Georgetown eventually gets its dam a lake will be created which will feed wells and increase the present supply four or five times.

Cr. Harrison criticized the CVCA for spending money on recreation parks.

And Deputy Reeve Young complained that the Authority has \$800,000 sitting in the bank, are buying farms at fancy prices and conserving water so much that "last year they flooded a number of homes in Glen Williams."

"Why don't you visit the Authority and learn what they're doing?" said Cr. Hyde. "To suggest they are responsible for Glen flooding is most unfair."

Mayor Gibbons, who has also

been critical of the Authority said the town is forced to pay the yearly grant whether it wants to or not.

"And believe me, if this was not so I'd vote against it," he added.

He asked Reeve Hunter, a town representative on the CVCA if he thinks Georgetown has benefited by the \$120,000 it has contributed.

"You're out in your figures," replied the reeve. "It's only in recent years that we have been contributing 90c per capita."

The reeve said council must be fair minded and that while Georgetown is second largest contributor, Toronto twp. has a \$50,000 yearly bill. A dam has been started at Orangeville the first in a chain of these to restore the Credit River to its former state.

"They are wise to buy land for future needs," he said. "Imagine what Terra Cotta park would cost today."

Cr. Hyde said the first interest in land acquisition is conserving water. Creation of parks actually supplements Authority funds through revenue derived from admissions.

Council decided to arrange a meeting with CVCA to get some facts about Georgetown's position.

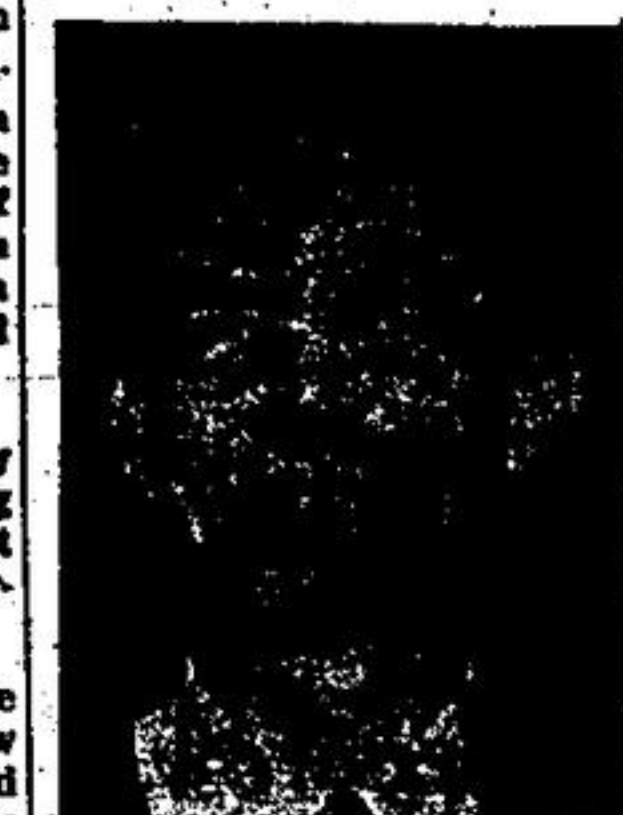
Action won the doubles, while Sam Unsworth and Dave Caperauld were first and second in the singles and both will be representing 120 at the District Congratulations, Sam!

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## Would Explain New Math In Classes For Parents

For parents, baffled by the "New Maths," help may be on the way. At Equestrian School last week, Limehouse School principal Eric Balkind proposed holding four one-hour evening classes to explain the new system to parents.

The School Board took no action, leaving it up to Mr. Balkind.

Mr. Balkind also asked for gym mats for his school, pointing out that children introduced to gymnastics at high school age will never become gymnasts. Trustee Dr. Alan Thompson backed up Mr. Balkind, stating that children need physical exercise, and some allotment should be provided for equipment.

Chairman Russell Miller felt if one school were to be supplied they all should, but consented to have the price of gym mats investigated.

A request from the Equestrian Women's Institute for permission to erect a cairn containing the old school bell on the grounds of an Equestrian School, as part of their centennial project, brought appreciative responses from the Board.

However, they asked for a plan of the cairn, showing the proposed location, before giving their approval.

Thermostats will be installed in Glen Williams School in an effort to control the temperature. "It must have been 90 in there last time I was in," commented Chairman Miller.

Permission was granted the Grades five and six of Lime-

house School to visit the library during school hours. At present Grades seven and eight use the library. The bus is paid for by the children's 15c fee.

The Board authorized the purchase of a sewing machine for the girls' auxiliary class at a cost of \$60.95, and voted to donate \$100 to the Halton Music Festival.

## Youth Productions Funds Allotted For Retarded

A score of Georgetown High School students have banded together to form what they call "Georgetown Youth Productions."

Writers, actors, musicians have all been busy rehearsing vocal numbers, comedy skits, dance routines, and orchestral arrangements to form a two-hour variety show. Their intention is to present this production in different schools in this and nearby towns, with all profits going to retarded children.

Canadian Legion Branch 120 is sponsoring the group, and paying incidental expenses involved in the programme.

"Georgetown Youth Productions" deserves all the support we can give it as these boys and girls set out to show what good things our young people are capable of doing," Legion President Ralph Hawes commented.

Mike Baker is musical director, arranger, and budding composer as well. Nick Martin has written several funny skits.
